—William Jennings Bryan will be the speaker at the chautauqua at Mt. Pleasant tomorrow. His subject will be "The Passing of Plutocracy." —St. Paul's coffee Thursday, Aug. 3. —A number of Keokuk golfers will go to Quincy Saturday to participate in an afternoon's play with members of the Quincy team. The list of players who are going has not yet been completed.

—Sherwood for new buggies. —Pat Jaques, the well known Keokuk semipro twirler, pitched for Farmington Sunday and lost to Bonaparte, 5 to 1. Five years ago Jaques was one of the most feared twirlers on the lots of Keokuk, but of late has lost some of his cunning.

—Keokuk Camp M. W. A. No. 622 will hold its regular meeting tonight at Woodman hall. All members are requested to be present.

—The contract for building the one room, frame school house for Jackson township (outside) has been awarded to George Kirchner, the lowest bidder. Work will start at once and the school house will cost \$1,468.74.

—Regular meeting of Hermann lodge, No. 116, I. O. O. F., tonight at 7:30 o'clock. Visiting brethren cordially invited.

—Mrs. Clarence Warburton whose husband is lying in the hospital slowly recovering from fearful burns he received while dressed in cotton preparatory to a plunge into the Mississippi river from the Keokuk and Hamilton bridge, today is soliciting means for a livelihood from the good people of Keokuk. The county is giving her what assistance the law allows, but this is inadequate for her wants. Mrs. Warburton has two children. She is a frail little woman of about thirty and is scarcely able to do anything. The family live at 617 South Fifth Street.

—The big transport steamer, "B. K. Yoakum," built at a cost of \$210,000 for the southern trade is still at Dubuque, Iowa, harbor waiting for high water. She has been at that place since April 1st, ready at any time the stage of water permitted, to proceed under her own head of steam to the gulf. But at no time since her completion has there been water enough over the rapids at Keokuk to admit her safe passage. In the meantime there is an interest loss on the investment in the boat of \$1,000 a month, at five per cent, or a loss to date of over \$3,500. And there is no telling how long the loss will continue.

—Save money now on summer goods at Central's clearing sale.

—It will be up to Attorney General Cosson to decide whether the grocers must sell vegetables by the measure or by weight. Commissioner Barney of the state food and dairy department believes that under the provisions of the new weight law he can compel the dealers to sell by weight instead of by measure. There is enough doubt in the law to warrant him in asking the opinion of the attorney general. His decision to take this step is the result of numerous complaints which are being filed with him every day charging short weights in vegetables. Yesterday morning F. D. Hubbard of Sheffield wrote him that he is paying 80 cents a peck for potatoes and that when he weighed them the peck only weighed 10.4 pounds. He put the question up to Commissioner Barney to say whether or not the grocer who sold him that short weight can be prosecuted under the state laws and also whether he can compel the grocers of Sheffield to sell him vegetables by the pound instead of by the measure.
