—Thousands of forest trees and fruit trees will be found dead next spring in that portion of Iowa which suffered by the recent drought. It is true that the drought is now broken and this territory has prospects for a corn crop such as has never been seen here and that oats and winter wheat were fine and hay was good. Yet the drought did its damage, and that damage will be called to mind next spring. What really killed the trees was the succession of two droughts, the long dry spell of 1910 and the dry spell of 1911. The 1910 drought was one of the longest and most damaging this territory probably has ever seen. In spite of its demoralizing effect, however, the good Iowa soil and agricultural climate would have pulled the trees through safely. But the very unusual happened; another drought came this year and the damage is beyond repair. Many trees could not stand two successive droughts and are doomed to die. Although the double drought ruined some of the young trees, it did most harm to the old trees, especially trees which had prospects of only from six to ten years of life. Many of these trees now show signs of being alive, but nursery men say they will die completely during the winter, and will never again produce a fruit crop. The loss in fruit, of course, cannot be estimated. It is a great one, however, especially when it is considered how much care and how many years a tree requires to get into the producing age.

—Evidence of the fact that State Labor Commissioner Van Duxin intends to enforce the state law requiring fire escapes on all buildings over two stories high, is the action of Inspector Walker of the department, who has just ordered 200 fire escapes in Davenport property owners to proceed immediately to put the fire escapes on. The commissioner has had considerable trouble of late over the failure of property owners in many cities of the state to comply with the fire escape law. In many instances notices sent out by the department have been ignored. Hereafter the department intends to prosecute all persons who have not complied with all the provisions of the law, so the commissioner states.

—A municipal incinerating plant in every city and town in Iowa, for the disposal of garbage, is proposed by Secretary Sumner of the state board of health, as one of the great municipal necessities of the present age. The disposition of garbage has always been a problem in every city, and more so than ever now that the crusade against the common house fly has become so general. He argues that it does not profit the state much to swat the flies and still leave their breeding places uncared for. Secretary Sumner believes that from the refuse created by the burning of the garbage a material for the making of a fine grade of building brick can be secured. The creation of this brick material from the garbage would more than pay for the cost of establishing the incinerating plant, in his opinion.
