

# FARMINGTON'S 7TH CHAUTAUQUA

Opened Saturday With a Large Audience and With Every Indication for Most Successful Season.

## NORTH POLE COOK TODAY

Program Made up of Celebrated Chautauqua Speakers and Anderson Park in Best of Shape for Meeting.

FARMINGTON, Aug. 6.—A record-breaking attendance was present at the opening of the seventh annual chautauqua Saturday. The grounds are in attractive condition and Anderson park is in its best appearance.

Chris Wendt, chairman of grounds, had the entire outfit on the grounds, tents up and seats in place for three thousand people. The assembly tent is the best secured in seven years and is 65x170 feet. Fifty campers' tents had already been pitched last night and it is believed that the supply on hand will not meet the increased demand.

Season Ticket Sale. The advance sale of season tickets closed Tuesday night with the receipts totalling \$1,045.50. Considering the dry weather, the management anticipated a big reduction in the advance sale, but the figures are little short of previous years.

Musical Program. Farmington's musical organizations, as a rule, are decidedly popular. For this season the Le Brun Grand Opera company is an innovation, bringing to the assembly the most expensive organization yet here.

The Dunbar bell ringers are an organization in a class by themselves and with no superiors. The Antias are a Dunbar organization, organized and drilled by Ralph Dunbar. The Musical Favorites are a versatile company of musical entertainers.

Of the great list secured for the 1911 assembly, Mrs. Lake and the Rev. E. W. Lanham are the only repeaters. With these exceptions the entire list of talent, twenty-nine people, is new in the Farmington assembly.

L. B. Wickersham and Dr. C. S. Medbury are both Iowa men, who have always made good.

Strickland W. Gilliland comes to the chautauqua Aug. 6 Sunday evening. Since the appearance of his "Gone With the Wind" in 1897, Mr. Gilliland has been a prime favorite in all of the states.

Charles E. Varney of Chicago has been a worker with workingmen, a preacher, an army officer, a college professor, and best of all, a popular lecturer. His "Apples of Gold" is the most unique lecture of the day.

Ralph Parlette, humorist, is dated for the last Saturday, Aug. 12. Here is a real philosopher, who clothes his thoughts in right words bulled into unusual, snappy, catchy sentences.

Sunday at Farmington. The Anderson park chautauqua has long been famous for its Sunday crowds. Keokuk and Montrose people may easily take advantage of the Burlington excursion train from Ft. Madison, which leaves Viele at 9:20 on both Sundays during the chautauqua.

Farmington always sends big delegations to Keokuk and will gladly welcome Keokuk people at Anderson park.
