

—Quincy Whig: Through the Keokuk Gate City we learn of the death in Keokuk Saturday night of William S. Sample. He was well known in Quincy, where he used to come during race meets several years ago. He was secretary of the Keokuk Fair association at the time the Baldwins made their famous parachute jumps in Keokuk about twenty-five years ago, lighting in the Mississippi river. He was also at one time chief of the fire department there, and being succeeded by John Anderson. Mr. Sample was a gentleman in every sense of the word, and one of the most enthusiastic advocates of the Keokuk water power that the city ever had. Even when it looked mighty bad for the success of the proposition, Mr. Sample always spoke in an optimistic vein, and was never known to say a word that could be considered as "running down" his home town. He was one of the original boosters of Keokuk, and we want to say right here that we are genuinely sorry that he is dead.

—The Iowa weather and crop bulletin for the week ending August 20 has just been issued as follows: The past week was hot and generally dry; the average daily excess of temperature being about 4 degrees, and the rainfall was much below the normal except over the northeastern counties and in some localities in Adair, Adams, Cass, Clarke, Ringgold and Union counties where copious to heavy showers occurred. The maximum temperatures on the 18th ranged from 98 to 105 degrees over the southern district, but for the state as a whole, the conditions were favorable for all late crops. Except some localities in southern and southwestern counties, corn, late potatoes, grass and apples made considerable improvement under the effect of light local showers during the week and the copious to heavy rains of the preceding week. Much of the early planted corn is beginning to dent and the late corn is in the roasting ear stage, and most of it is doing well. Even in the dry districts, occasional light showers have checked the deterioration of corn. Pastures and late potatoes have made a decided improvement over the northern and southern districts and now affords considerable feed. Threshing has been resumed in the northeastern counties and much fall plowing has been done.
