

## CLASS MARKS PLAY ON GOLF COURSE

### 3 LOW SCORES MADE

Matless and Sheldon Turn In Cards of 36, One Above Record, While Edgar Cochrane Gets a 37.

Keokuk golfers indulged in some brilliant performances on the Country Club links Saturday afternoon while playing cards in the president's cup tourney which is now in progress. Perdue Sheldon and James Matless, playing together, negotiated the course in 36, which is one over the record, while Edgar R. Cochrane made a 37.

Sheldon made the ninth hole in two strokes, duplicating for the first time a trick turned by Ellsworth last year. To make a 2 on No. 9 is unusual because it is necessary to hole an approach which Sheldon did for one hundred yards.

Cochrane had a record-breaking 37. He played eight holes in four strokes each and took five shots on the treacherous No. 7.

## JACK FROST HAS ARRIVED

Heavy Frost, the Worst in Twenty Years, is Covering Canada.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service] WINNIPEG, Manitoba, Aug. 26.—Reports of extreme heavy frost, the worst in twenty odd years, are coming in from over the northern portion of Saskatchewan and northern Alberta tonight. Gilbert Plains and other points reported from 6 to 8 degrees of frost, with vines and small vegetation severely hit. In places the frost was so severe that the grass snapped under foot and grave fear is expressed by farmers that the late grain has been seriously injured.

The reported outlook late tonight is for rain over Sunday to be followed by frost. According to well informed grain growers the farmers are now passing a critical point.


