CITY NEWS.

—Let Sherwood repair yo-r harness, 703 Main.

—The Owls' carnival takes place the first week in October.

—The steamer St. Paul arrived in the city a half hour after midnight from St. Louis, enroute to St. Paul. The Dubuque was in this morning at 2 o'clock from the south and returned to St. Louis at six.

—By Scouts of America, from the Carthage, Warsaw and Macomb patrols, to the number of twenty, are camping ten days at Glen Ellen, three miles above Hamilton, through the courtesy of Mr. Cooper of the Water Power Co. The boys spent today in Keokuk, and were shown over the water power works by Mr. R. O. Marsh of the central office, and in the afternoon were guests of the Y. M. C. A. of this city. The encampment continues until Wednesday.

—Automobile owners and others will be interested in the following bit of data from the Independent magazine: It is estimated that there are at present 500,000 licensed automobiles in the United States. The premiums for fire and theft insurance amount to over \$17,000,000 for collision insurance \$15,000,000, and for liability insurance \$22,000,000. The value of all licensed cars is placed at \$500,000,000 and the annual tire expense at \$50,000,000.

—Thursday evening, August 31, The Daily Gate City will issue its annual booster edition. It will be an interesting number and contain a vast amount of water power information with illustrations showing the progress of the work from its inception up to the present time. —The Kahoka fair will be held this week and many Keokuk people are planning to be present. Thursday will be the big day.

—It is expected that John DeWitt, the newly appointed secretary of the Keokuk Industrial Association, will be able to take up his active duties not later than the fifteenth of September, and possibly as early as the tenth.

—J. Ralston Hayden and George R. Hassall were present at the Elgin races Saturday and saw Dave Buck's Pope-Hartford turn turtle, killing Buch and his mechanic. They also saw the grandstand collapse, injuring about 500 persons. The two Keokuk men were in a section of the grandstand not far distant.

—Rev. T. H. Agnew, of Waverly, Ill., will be in the city and preach at the Church of the Nazarene, 219 Main street, on Tuesday evening, August 29. A good attendance is required of all members as there will be some important business to be attended to. All are welcome to the service whether members of not.

—A Keokuk lady lost a gold watch last week and inserted an advertisement in The Gate City want column requesting the return of the property. A subscriber of The Gate City found the watch and found the advertisement in the paper on his return from a trip on the road, and this morning the property was restored to the owner. —Five hundred members of the Iowa-Nebraska association of colored Baptists will be entertained in Ottumwa, September 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 when the annual convention of the Women's Home and Foreign Mission movement meeting is to be held in the Second Baptist church there. Rev. M. J. Burton of Keokuk is state missionary for the association.

—Auto parties come in large numbers to the city each Sunday and make the hotels their stopping places for dinner and supper. Yesterday at the Hotel Keokuk, the guest list was large, as it was the Sunday previous. Music was furnished by the Orpheum orchestra, which is proving an attractive feature to the dinner parties from 12:30 to 2:00 o'clock.

—The Owls' advertising committee has begun the preparation of advertising matter for the fall carnival to be held during the first week in October and an abundance of literature will be distributed announcing the event. The Parker Carnival Co. has already sent in a large amount of literature and there is no doubt but what the information about the carnival will be plentiful and effectual.

—Rev. John C. Sage, pastor of St. John's Episcopal church, his wife and daughter are expected to arrive home some time this week from St. Joseph's Island, Canada, where they have been spending the pastor's vacation time. It is probable that the Episcopal conference will attend the Episcopal convention at Duluth, Minn., to be in session soon and the pulpit may be filled by another minister on the coming Sunday.

—Boy Scouts of America will be interested in the following special from Camp Cooper, two and one-half miles north of Hamilton, Ill., where the first camp of the kind in this part of the country is being held: The first general encampment of the Boy Scouts of America ever held in this part of the country is now in progress at this beautiful spot on the river, kindly loaned to us for the purpose by Mr. Cooper, of the Water Power Company. Representatives of the scout patrols from Carthage, Macomb and Warsaw are here to the number of twenty, the camp being in charge of Rev. Dr. J. M. D. Davidson, of Carthage, scoutmaster, and Major W. B. Risse, also of Carthage, as commandant. Mr. John Mitchell, scout commissioner, of Oklahoma, is present as a visitor and has charge of the department of physical culture.

—Investigations of possible sites for developing water power on the public domain are being pushed by the United States Geological Survey, with resulting withdrawals of land from entry where it is found that valuable sites exist. In July 31,725 acres of such land were withdrawn, including a great number of power sites. No estimate has been made of the horsepower involved, but owing to the character of the power sites withdrawn it is believed to be very large. These July withdrawals make a total outstanding area withdrawn of 1,546,258 acres, based on the examination and recommendation of the Geological Survey, and involving thousands of power sites and doubtless millions of horsepower. The withdrawals are made in aid of proposed legislation by congress which shall provide for the fullest possible development of these enormously valuable properties and at the same time guard the public interests.
