

REV. POTTER GOES TO SIOUX FALLS

Pastor of Trinity M. E. Church Transferred to Charge Out of State and Sioux Falls Minister Succeeds Him.

PARISHIONERS SORRY

Regret That He is to Leave Keokuk After Several Years of Efficient Work as Pastor in This City.

Rev. John Wesley Potter, for several years pastor of the Trinity M. E. church of Keokuk, was transferred to the Dakota conference and appointed to the First Church, Sioux Falls, South Dakota, at the annual meeting of the Iowa conference in Fairfield, Iowa, yesterday. Rev. Potter will retain his present charge until about the middle of October. He will be succeeded in Keokuk by the Rev. Dr. J. M. Brown of Sioux Falls. The Iowa conference passed the following resolution in making the transfer:

Resolved, That on the occasion of the transfer of John Wesley Potter, D. D., to the Dakota Conference we express our high appreciation of his christian character, his eminent services as pastor, preacher and secretary of this conference for eight years. We commend him to the fellowship of our Dakota brethren, and if in the providence of God, our bishops should think it advisable to return him for work to this conference we shall receive him with the most cordial christian welcome.

Many Changes.

FAIRFIELD, Iowa, Sept. 12.—When Bishop Cranston read the appointments yesterday afternoon it became evident that the Iowa conference had experienced the greatest shakeup it has known in some years. The shakeup occurred largely in the construction of the Ottumwa and Oskaloosa districts, and there are some brand new charges and some of the old ones have gone out of existence.

In the matter of appointment less than half of the preachers are returned to their former charges. Eugene Allen and C. E. Pettit remain at their present Burlington churches, but at Grace church J. W. Pool succeeds J. W. Lambert. E. A. Bentzinger continues to serve the Burlington circuit, and Warren J. Phillips is appointed to the West Burlington charge.

Change in Names of Places.

The following are the changes in the names of places: Kingston is a new point in the Burlington district; Fremont, Kirksville, Hedrick and Martinsburg change from the Ottumwa to the Oskaloosa district; Richland, Packwood and Highland go into the Ottumwa district, and Ollie and Buffalo district appear from the list of charges in the conference.

Fairfield entertained the conference in the characteristic "Fairfield way," and under the able direction of Dr. Thomas Osborn, pastor of the Fairfield Methodist church, the conference was given entertainment second to none. From the Wesleyan banquet, which was the "greatest ever," to the minutest detail, Dr. Osborn and his assistants succeeded in fulfilling every expectation.

MILWAUKEE FIGHT SHOW OPPOSED

Sheriff and Acting Governor Firm in Opposition to Wolgast-McFarland go on Friday Evening.

THE ACTING GOVERNOR

Declares He Will go to Milwaukee on the Day of the Fight and See That His Orders Are Obeyed.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Sept. 12.—The "boxing contest" between Lightweight Champion Ad Wolgast and Packer McFarland at the Auditorium at Milwaukee, September 15, will be given as scheduled, said Matchmaker Frank Mulhern last night, after a conference with the promoters of the affair. Sheriff Arnold is just as positive that the contest will not be staged. "This does not mean," said Sheriff Arnold, "that the men will be permitted to fight and then be arrested. It means that Wolgast and McFarland will not fight in Milwaukee Friday night. I shall prevent the fight." "Fighting for prizes is prohibited in Wisconsin and always has been," says Mulhern. "The late Judge Brazee, in a test case brought to establish a working rule, held that a ten-round, no-decision boxing exhibition, with nothing contingent on the result was not a violation of the law. This is what we originally proposed to give in the way of an entertainment and we have taken the matter up with the various authorities concerned and expect no interference. The show will be given as scheduled." Wolgast took a day off in his training today. After a short spin on the road early in the day, he tipped the beam at 127½ pounds. Manager Tom Jones ordered him to take things easy so the day was spent in automobiling.

SPRING LAKE, N. J., Sept. 12.—Gov. Francis E. McGovern of Wisconsin declared that he would not interfere in any way with plans for preventing or permitting the Wolgast and McFarland fight in Milwaukee next Friday night. He was not in possession of information sufficient, he said, to enable him to act. "I left no instructions with the mayor of Milwaukee, as has been reported," Mr. McGovern added, "and I am unable to say at long range whether the exhibition will be a boxing match or a prize fight. Under the laws of Wisconsin, a boxing match is not objectionable, but a prize fight is prohibited. All I know about this matter is what I have read in the newspapers and the accounts have been so conflicting that I should not wish to pass judgment on the question on these reports alone and at long range. Therefore, I shall have to leave the question to be decided by the local authorities and Acting Governor Morris, should he see fit to investigate it."

LA CROSSE, Wis., Sept. 12.—Explaining his telegram to Sheriff Arnold at Milwaukee to stop the Wolgast-McFarland fight, Acting Governor Morris said: "The law is perfectly plain. In my opinion the proposed fight will be a violation of the law. My duty is to stop it." The acting governor is planning to go to Milwaukee and will be on the ground on the date set for the fight to see that the law is obeyed.



HILTON SECOND IN OPENING PLAY

British Amateur Champion Turns in Card Next to Sherman in Tourney at Rye, N. Y.

RYE, N. Y., Sept. 12.—The sun had disappeared behind the West Chester hills when the last of the 170 players in yesterday's eighteen-hole qualifying round for the seventeenth amateur golf championship holed out on the final green and it was discovered that only those having cards of 84 or better could continue today. As there were ten players who made 84, they will play off today for the last four places of the sixty-four players who will compete in the second medal round of eighteen holes. The thirty-two players who make the best scores for the thirty-six holes will then be paired for the first round of match play at eighteen holes in the afternoon.

Watching British Contenders. A dozen others did better than 80, and in this number appeared J. Douglas Brown of the Murray Field Club of Edinburgh, Scotland, who in 1907 was the Irish champion. Brown is regarded as a dark horse, and has been coupled with Hilton in the betting, on the possibility of the Haver-meyer cup going to Great Britain. Hilton was easily the golfing magnet of the day and drew a large gallery. The greater part of this crowd left him at the sixteenth green, however, in order to watch "Chick" Evans, who was then on his outward journey.

The links were soaked early in the day by a two-hour rain that deadened the turf and added strokes to the early scores. With the exception of Gardner, few of the early starters were able to get under 80. The conditions improved later.
