ADDITIONAL JURORS NEEDED

Judge Hamilton Ordered Special Venire to be Drawn for \$25,000 Damage Suit Against Taber Co.

MUCH LEGAL TALENT

Two Firms and Three Attorneys Have Been Engaged in the Case—Examinations of Jurors Begun.

With twenty-two petit jurors out of forty either excused or not found in the county, Judge W. S. Hamilton was obliged to order the drawing of a special venire to accommodate the big damage suit of Million vs. the Taber Lumber Company, which has been begun. Court made an order that thirty be drawn and they were summoned to appear at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The new jurors follow:

Special Venire Called. This afternoon at 2 o'clock the special venire drawn, following an order made last night by Judge Hamilton answered the summons, and after the clerk had called the role, preparations were immediately made for beginning an examination to secure a jury in the Taber damage suit for \$25,000.

GREAT TRIAL HAS STARTED

(Continued from page 1.) Instigated and James McNamara actually caused the Times disaster. It's evidence will be driven home by Ortle McManigal, who is alleged to have confessed that he had done hundreds of dynamite jobs for John McNamara, receiving \$200 for each, and that he knew of the plans to destroy the Times.

All this evidence the defense will combat with testimony to show that there never was a dynamite explosion; that leaking gas caused the wreckage; that the accused men are innocent, the victims of a gigantic plot which has for its object the branding of organized labor leaders as murderers and dynamiters.

Next in the chain of events came the arrest of Ortle McManigal, John and James McNamara. The McNamaras were extradited from the east without being given a chance to consult counsel, and as a result Detective Wm. J. Burns, who ran down the accused while in the employ of the National Erectors Association, and of the Merchants and Manufacturers Association of Los Angeles, and Detective James Hosick of Los Angeles, are under indictment for kidnaping.

All these elements will enter into the case, but the first and principal thing the prosecution must prove is that the Times building was blown up by dynamite and not by gas. And it is the proof of what actually caused the disaster upon which the success or failure of the prosecution will depend.
