**ELOPE TO KEOKUK IN AUTOMOBILE**

A. B. Rogers and Miss Marion Gardner, Two Socially Prominent People, Outwit Their Parents.

**OF WEALTHY FAMILIES**

Bride is Daughter of J. Willis Gardner, President of the Gardner Governor Works of Quincy.

A. B. Rogers and Miss Marion Gardner, members of two of the most socially prominent families of Quincy, eloped to Keokuk in an automobile Saturday and were married late in the afternoon by Rev. John C. Sage, pastor of St. John's Episcopal church. The elopement has thrown Quincy's best social circle into a fit of wild speculation, according to press reports received by The Gate City which investigated the story. No wedding has created such a stir and friends are wondering what the parental objections were that occasioned secrecy of wedding plans. From the Whig office Saturday night the report was received that the members of neither family would make any statements. Mr. Geo. Gardner, father of the girl, admitted receiving a telegram announcing the marriage early last evening. Both families say the marriage is a complete surprise to them.

Miss Gardner is the daughter of J. Willis Gardner, president of the Gardner governor works which employs nearly one thousand men, and is considered one of the richest men in western Illinois. The family has long been one of the social leaders and the daughter especially popular. A. B. Rogers, the groom, is the son of Mrs. Ella Rogers, a wealthy widow, who resides on East Main.

Mr. Rogers and Miss Gardner left Quincy Saturday morning, slipping away in Mr. Roger's automobile unbeknown to any of their friends. They reached Keokuk about 3 o'clock in the afternoon and an hour later were whisked to the home of Rev. Sage armed with the marriage license which had been obtained from the county clerk. Shortly after the ceremony they sent telegrams to folks back home, acquainting them with the news.

Friends believe that there were objections to the marriage on one side or the other, but they are at a loss to know just what they were. Mr. Rogers and Miss Gardner have been sweethearts of their school days and quite intimate for a number of years. Miss Gardner is quite well known in Keokuk, having visited here on numerous occasions and attending parties given by the younger society set. But a short time ago she was a guest of Miss Hannah Hawkes.

**PUT IT IN YOUR PIPE AND SMOKE IT**

Plans for Reorganizing the Tobacco Trust Have Been Made Public.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—A reported form of the manner in which the tobacco trust will be dissolved in accordance with the recent agreement with Attorney General Wickersham, was given out here this evening. Earlier in the day another account was published which was discovered by the trust officials to be incorrect.

The statement now issued will be filed in the federal court on Monday. According to this statement the American Tobacco Co., is to be divided into four corporations, not one of which will prove a controlling interest in the tobacco business. These four companies will be the American Tobacco Co., Liggett & Myers Tobacco Co. (to be organized); the P. Lorillard Company (to be organized), and the R. J. Reynolds Tobacco Company (to be organized).

The common stock of the new companies will be sold for cash at par to the common stockholders of the American Tobacco Company. This sum will be used for the retirement and cancellation of the legislative bonds of American Tobacco Company. Each 6 bondholders in the American Tobacco Company will be offered \$120 in cash for half his holdings and for the other half seven per cent bonds at par. In the aggregate, of the Liggett & Myers and P. Lorillard Companies. Each 4 bondholders in the American company will be offered \$96 in cash for half his holdings and for the other half five per cent bonds at par, in the aggregate, of the Liggett & Myers and Lorillard companies.

Each preferred stockholder of the American company will be offered the right to exchange one-third of his holdings at par into seven per cent preferred stock of the Liggett & Myers and Lorillard companies.

According to the petition the effect of these changes will be to reduce the assets of the American company by \$104,236,750 and the control of the company will pass from the twenty-nine original defendants to the holders of \$92,701,800 preferred and common stock. The petition also states that the cost of dissolution of the trust will be at least \$22,000,000. It adds that this amount will be permanently taken from the stockholders

**DATE SET FOR HER MURDER TRIAL**


Mrs. Gertrude Gibson Patterson Will Face the Jury on November Twentieth.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] DENVER, Colo. Oct. 14.—Mrs. Gertrude Patterson will be tried on Nov. 20 for the murder of her husband, Chas. A. Patterson. This date was set by Judge Allen in the West Side Court today, following the woman's plea of not guilty, and despite the protests of Attorney O. N. Hilton, counsel for Mrs. Patterson. Hilton declared that he cannot get ready for trial before the middle of December. He announced that some witnesses will be called from Chicago and that some may even be called from across the Atlantic.

Hamilton gave as further reason for delay that he is a witness in the McNamara case in Los Angeles and that he may be called there at any time.

**The Jewel Box Alarm.**

An ingenious invention, which will undoubtedly prove useful to the possessor of valuable jewels and trinkets, is the jewel box alarm, recently put on the market. In the bottom of the box is fixed the small instrument, which is to be electrically discharged by moving a small lever. The sound is made by means of a bell and clapper, resembling those found in a telephone. In the center of the box hangs a small pendulum. If the box is moved the pendulum swings, the circuit is closed and the alarm goes off. The noise resembles that of an alarm clock, and does not cease until it is shut off again.
