

TRANSFER CASE TO FEDERAL COURT

Motion of Water Power Company Attorneys in Injunction Suit Sustained at Carthage This Morning.

AN ACT OF CONGRESS

Water Power Company Contended That Cause is One Having to Do With Federal Statutes.

[Special to The Gate City.] CARTHAGE, Ill., Oct. 16.—That the injunction cases pending against the Mississippi River Power company which is building the big dam at Keokuk, Iowa, be transferred from the circuit court of Hancock county to the federal court at Springfield, Illinois, was asked by attorneys for the Water Power company in a motion filed here today.

One of the important grounds upon which the motion is based is that the controversy involves a construction of an act of congress, and the cause is one which the Water Power company's attorneys believe should be tried in the federal court.

Two injunction proceedings of importance have been recently instituted against the Water Power company to restrain further building of the dam. Only a few weeks ago Keokuk attorneys representing Albert Hagerla, a prominent Green Bay farmer, asked that further construction which would cause his land to be flooded be stopped by court. In this case the Water Power company was given until today to answer. A case not so recent is that brought by Attorney W. H. Hartzell of Carthage for Black and Loomis of Dallas City, Illinois, who are possessed of an island in the Mississippi river which will be inundated. Both cases are somewhat similar.

Transfer of Case Granted. CARTHAGE, Ill., Oct. 16.—The motion for a transfer of the injunction case pending against the Mississippi River Power company from the circuit court of Hancock county to the federal court at Galesburg, Illinois, was sustained today by Judge Greer.

SEESAW WEATHER FOR THIS WEEK

Forecast for Next Few Days Says There Will Be Some Rapid Changes.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 16.—Rapid changes in temperature, accompanied by rains, will mark the weather of the present week, according to the weekly forecast issued by the weather bureau.

The rainfall will be heavy in the North Pacific states, but the south will find it below normal, while the remainder of the country will be visited by the precipitation usual to the season.

"A disturbance which occurred over the plains states," the forecast continues, "will advance to the lake region Monday and thence will move to the eastern states Monday or Tuesday. It will be attended with rains over the middle west and north states east of the Mississippi, and high winds over the lakes."

"It will be followed by cooler weather in the interior districts east of the Rocky Mountains with probably frosts Monday in the Rocky Mountain regions and Tuesday in the plains states and upper Mississippi valley and the lake region."

"The next disturbance will appear on the North Pacific coast Monday or Tuesday."

WAITERS ARE ON A STRIKE

Co-operative Scheme Did Not Work in This Case Very Satisfactorily.

TURIN, Oct. 16.—The waiters at the co-operative restaurant at the exhibition here are on strike, and the anti-socialist newspapers here are seriously arguing that the dispute proves the impracticability of the doctrine of communism. For the restaurant is managed by a socialist society, the Co-operative Alliance.

The immediate cause of the strike was the discharge of a waiter who went to the manager to expound the grievances of himself and his fellows. The manager called in the police who threw the waiters' representative out of the place.

Now the waiters, 40 in all, are picketing the restaurant to prevent the employment of "blacklegs," holding meetings and expounding on "solidarity," and writing delightfully furious letters to the newspapers protesting against the employment of force "for the protection of the capitalist interests of the socialists of the alliance," and "against the outrage on the right to organize and strike."

In the meantime the co-operative scheme is working nicely, only the alliance is co-operating with its customers now instead of with the waiters. Each customer is given a voucher which is exchanged at the kitchen for food.

GERMAN SOCIALISTS BALANCE SHEET

Tremendous Strides of the Party Which Now Has 836,562 Members.

BERLIN, Oct. 16.—The Socialist party has just issued its balance sheet for the year, which shows the tremendous strides the party is making in Germany.

There are 836,562 registered members (all voters) as compared with 720,038 at the close of last year. The party has organizations in 383 of the 397 Reichstag constituencies, and in the Reichstag itself 47 percent of the members are socialists.

The party owns 81 newspapers, and distributed 3,500,000 pamphlets in the year. The "Vorwarts," the principal organ of the party, has a circulation of 157,000 as compared with 122,000 in July 1910. It made a clear profit during the year ending June 30 of \$35,000, which helps to fill the socialist war chest. "Der Wahre Jakob," the comic paper published by the party, has 307,000 subscribers, as compared with 286,000 at the end of last year, and already this year it has handed over to the party profits of \$10,000.
