Cutwright had been drinking and grew insulting to the proprietor of the place. A short time after words with the saloon keeper, Cutwright left the bar room and was advised by a friend to go home. He took offense at this and was placed under arrest a short time later by Night Captain of Police Fuqua and Officer Weber of the water power works. Cutwright evidently carried a gun or some other weapon before his arrest as he requested his wife, who accompanied the officers and her husband to the station, to "give me that."

Cutwright was locked up, crying because of his arrest, in the meantime.

Acee's Son Flourishing Razor.

A few minutes after his father's arrest, Willie Cutwright entered the saloon of Frank Wisemann at Twelfth and Main and was accompanying some threatening remarks with razor brandishings. A man known as "Jack the painter" relieved the younger Cutwright of his colored picnic implement and the negro was locked up in the cooler at the police station by officer John Tighe.

That father and son Cutwright started out looking for trouble is a coincidence, both about the same time and in saloons owned by proprietors of the same name.

SYRACUSE 6; MICHIGAN 6

Stagg's Team Outplayed Easterners, But Were Unable to Grab Victory.

VANIMAN HOPEFUL OF FUTURE SUCCESS

Believes the Time Will Come When Ocean is Crossed in an Airship.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., Nov. 4.—Hard as the luck was that he had today with his dirigible "Akron," in which—maybe—he is soon going to fly across the Atlantic ocean, Aviator Melvin Vaniman wasn't a particle discouraged tonight.

"We are going to attempt this trans-Atlantic flight whatever happens," he said, speaking for himself and crew. "We believe it can be done, and when accomplished, it will be one more advance in science."

"Americans do not display the same deep, serious interest that is shown by the leading European nations in aviation."

"We may fail, but even having failed, if I survive I shall still be convinced of the practicability of crossing the Atlantic in mid-air, that some one will be first to show the way and that that way will be followed by an innumerable many."

"Our first attempt to reach the north pole in a dirigible proved that we could not navigate an airship with the sextant and compass. The compass told us which way north was, but not the way the airship was going. The sun was invisible and the sextant lay useless. Thus we became hopelessly lost and finally landed on a glacier."

"The second polar voyage demonstrated the efficiency of the newly designed aerial extant, the drift dial and the orientable propellers, which not only drive the ship forward but up, down, or at any angle."

MEXICANS LOOKING FOR BIG UPRISING

Dawn of Sunday Expected as Time for Reyes Revolution to Start.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] JUAREZ, Mex. Nov. 4.—With the dawn of Sunday, thousands of Mexicans in the leading cities of Mexico will begin to await the fulfillment of a vague rumor that the Reyes party is to join the great uprising against Madero on that day.

From all corners of Mexico today come stories that tomorrow the Reyes leaders, fully supplied with arms and funds, would rise in all the cities and towns of Mexico and call upon the people to fight the government of Francisco I. Madero which goes into office at Mexico City on Monday.

The excuse of the Reyes party, in influencing the people is that Madero in overthrowing Diaz because of his oppression, has fallen into the power of Jose Yves Limantour, the powerful scientific leader and the very man who is generally supposed to have controlled the Diaz government.

The situation in Juarez tonight is typical of the unrest which will prevail until Madero takes over the presidency Monday. Up and down the dark streets throngs of blanketed peons passed in a drizzling rain, jabbering excitedly of what is expected to happen before sun down tomorrow. Most of them indicated that they fully expected the Reyes uprising to begin all over the great southern republic tomorrow, basing their predictions on the belief that this will be the last opportunity the Reyes faction will have to strike a telling blow at Madero before he comes into power.

Keno games ran as usual and large crowds of peons gathered in the streets near the bright glare from the resorts. Everywhere was the general fear that something direful was to happen.

A rumor that is generally repeated was that a plot to assassinate Madero was afoot. Its source is unknown but not much credence is put in it here.

SHOE MACHINE TRUST IS INDIGNANT

Says Sherman Anti-Trust Law Has Nothing to Do With Them.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] BOSTON, Mass., Nov. 4.—Despite the supreme court's now famous ruling in the meaning of the Sherman anti-trust law, the United States Shoe Machinery Co. in its demurrer to an indictment charging violation of the law, maintains that the Sherman statute is unconstitutional. The demurrer was filed today through the company's officers, Sidney W. Wilson, president; Edward Hurd, William Harbour and Elmer P. Howe, all directors.

The demurrer declares that the provisions of the Sherman act are "too vague, indefinite and uncertain to create and define an offense against the United States" and that declaring unreasonable restraints of interstate trade or monopoly illegal, it delegates to a body other than congress the creation or definition of what constitutes the offense, and therefore the statute is unconstitutional.

In attacking the seven counts of the indictment the demurrer emphasizes that the recent decisions of the United States supreme court have mainly had to deal with the civil or equity side of relief prescribed by the Sherman act. The present case is brought under the criminal provisions of the statute.

The defendants declare counts in the indictments are faulty in that they do not charge that the alleged monopoly acquired by the United Shoe Co. for the defendants, acts as constituting a monopoly in "unreasonable restraint" of interstate commerce or trade.

It is further asserted that inasmuch as the articles in the acquired company and the United Shoe Company are patented, they do not come within the Sherman act.

It is not alleged in the counts, the officials declare with sufficient certainty that, how, or in what manner interstate trade was unreasonable or illegally restrained by the United Shoe Company. The defendants say it does not appear that the alleged offense was committed here. The company is a New Jersey company.

OHIO POLITICS BECOMING WARM

City Elections on Monday and Selection of Delegates to Constitutional Convention.

[Gate City Leased Wire Service.] CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 4.—Whether the initiative and referendum and recall are to be written into the Ohio state constitution will largely be decided at the elections to be held throughout Ohio next Tuesday. Although all cities will hold municipal elections, the contest for the selection of delegates to the convention to frame a new constitution has attracted nation-wide notice. Progressives of both parties have united in pledging their delegates to the initiative and referendum, so that this is clearly drawn between the "stand-pat" and progressive elements in Cincinnati and Cleveland, the indications are for a democratic victory in both cities. Newton Baker, close advisor to the late Tom L. Johnson, is opposed for mayor by Frank Hodgen, republican. Baker has made his campaign largely on a platform favoring a \$2,000,000 bond issue for the erection of a municipal electric light plant. Odds of 4 to 1 are offered that Baker will win.

The Cincinnati campaign has been much the same as in previous years: the independent republicans and democrats fighting the Cox machine. The machine has endorsed the Cox candidate, Mayor Louis Schwab. The betting today, however, favors the democratic candidate, Henry T. Hunt. As county prosecutor Hunt trailed Fox mercilessly, finally bringing about his indictment on a charge of perjury. A Cox judge saved the boss from trial on technicalities. The independent republicans have a candidate for mayor in Theo. Horstman. This is known as the "Abraham Lincoln ticket," and is backed by republicans opposed to Cox.
