

BISHOP TUTTLE CREDITS OTHERS

High Regard of Episcopal Clergy Who Will be in Keokuk Next Thursday for Other Denominations.

HE IS A LEADER

The English Dined Him With Royalty and Lauded Him as a "Grand Old Man."

The Episcopal Bishop, D. S. Tuttle who comes here next Thursday to speak before two women's and a men's meetings on the afternoon and evening of that day, is no common personage according to the metropolitan press. He has been in England, dined with royalty and been heralded as the "greatest presiding officer," of several occasions. On first reflection, he reminds one much of Rev. George C. Williams, the Keokuk congregational minister, with his inviting and convincing way. There will no doubt be many at the meetings where Bishop Tuttle will speak next Thursday.

From the St. Louis Republic, the following notice of his visit there, has been clipped and will doubtless be read with hearty interest by those who expect to hear Bishop Tuttle this week:

The Interdenominational Woman's Missionary Social Union, into which the Episcopalians have lately come, gave ringing applause to Bishop D. S. Tuttle yesterday morning at St. Peter's church when he spoke to them on women's missionary spirit and interdenominational comity, advising them not to break down entirely the denominational fences. The bishop was not slow to give credit to the Congregationalists for having the oldest Board of Foreign Missions, to the Baptists for evangelizing Burma, to Roman Catholics for pioneer missionary work, to the Methodists for "being everywhere," and to all other denominations as well as his own. He added, shrewdly:

"God bless you in your efforts to show and receive good will. But don't try to go too fast. If you try to go too fast you will mix things up and have friction. I am a farmer's boy. I lived on a farm as a lad, and I can remember from earliest recollections that the farmers who kept up their line fences were apt to be much better friends than the farmers who let their line fences break down, so that the cattle could go over as they pleased, from one side to the other. Move slowly, in love and friendship, in mutual forbearance and in loving co-operation, not forced by outside councils or concordats, but by the love and earnestness and zeal in your own hearts."

After the bishop had gone, the rector of St. Peter's, Rev. D. C. Garret, emphasized still more the cordial welcome that had been given to his ecclesiastical superior, raising the question that he wondered if the women really knew what "a grand old man" Bishop Tuttle is.

"Do you know how they treat him in England?" he asked. "Why, they conferred honorary LL. D.'s on him all over the country; he was entertained by royalty, and the British press spoke of him as 'the greatest presiding officer' (when he was at the Lambeth Conference) who was then in England."
