—About 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon a rain which made the day and night miserable with its varied drizzling and downpour, started and continued all through the night. Today gave promise of some colder weather.

—Do you know that you can buy a buggy at cost at Sherwood's?

—Iowa produced 4,500,000 bushels of apples this year, according to estimates made by Wesley Greene state horticulturist. He figures that the consumption of apples in this state is about one bushel for every person, or a total of 2,225,000 bushels of apples will be consumed in Iowa from this year's crop.

—Funeral services were held this afternoon at three o'clock for the late William Thompson, ex-fire chief, at the family residence, 1903 Main street. Reverend Pearson of the Swedish Methodist Episcopal church, conducted the service. Interment was made in Oakland cemetery, in the family lot.

—The state board of control is going into the business of manufacturing the vanilla and lemon extracts needed at all of the state institutions for the next year. The board has control of fourteen institutions which require large quantities of extracts during the course of the year. The failure of manufacturers to bid sufficiently low on the contracts for the year ending October 31, 1912, is the cause of the sudden determination of the board to go into the manufacture of these extracts. The extracts will be made at the state insane hospital at Cherokee. The work of manufacturing will start at once.

Rowena Morse of the Unitarian church will be sorry to learn that her mother has been seriously ill, the Quincy Whig of yesterday, stating: The Friends in Council hear from Dr. M. Rowena Morse that her mother, who has been seriously ill, continues to improve. She will be in Quincy to lecture under their auspices on Thursday, December 7. The money for tickets to the lecture to have been given October 26 will be refunded, and other tickets can be secured. Dr. Morse's mother has been so ill that she was obliged to ask for a supply for two Sundays in her pulpit in the Third Unitarian church.

MT. PLEASANT AND SALEM ARE KICKING

Ask Railroad Commissioners to Reverse Present Train Schedule on North Road.


Industrial Agent John DeWitt, J. B. Well, M. E. Justice and possibly others will go to Mt. Pleasant this evening to attend a hearing to be held by the railroad commissioners with reference to the train service of the North road between Keokuk and Mt. Pleasant. The railroad commissioners, in response to petitions from Mt. Pleasant and Salem business men, called a meeting for Nov. 7th. The petitioners want the schedule reversed and instead of train No. 509 leaving Mt. Pleasant in the morning and arriving in Keokuk at 11:30, departing at 3:30 in the afternoon, the Mt. Pleasant people want the train to start from Keokuk and lay over there. That was the formal schedule and Keokuk, Donnellson and many other points obtained a reversal of the schedule, as the greater part of the mileage is in Lee county and many of the patrons of the road want to come to Keokuk to transact legal and commercial business. The Keokuk delegation will resist the petition of the Mt. Pleasant and Salem people and request that the train service be allowed to remain as it is.
