MRS. NARRLEY IS MOURNED

Death of Beloved Wife and Mother This Morning at Family Residence, 513 Concert Street.

WAS ILL TWO WEEKS

Anna Summerhalder Was Born in Switzerland, Nearly Sixty-nine Years Ago—in Keokuk Since 1859.

Mrs. Anna Summerhalder Narrley died this morning at 8 o'clock at her home, 513 Concert street, succumbing a serious two week's illness abated from chronic stomach and bowel trouble, with other complications. Although it has been known for some time that Mrs. Narrley was not in the best of health, her demise is somewhat surprising and a deep sorrow to many friends who had known the elderly lady for a number of years, and to the relatives.

Anna Summerhalder was born in Unterkum, Canton Grau, Switzerland, November 23, 1842. On the eighth of March, 1852, she emigrated with relatives to this country, landing at New Orleans, La. There she remained until three months later, when removing to Nauvoo, Ill. Mrs. Narrley made that her home for six years. In 1859 she came to Keokuk and had since been a resident of Keokuk. Her marriage to John Narrley, the husband who survives, occurred November 15, 1862.

Mrs. Narrley was a member of St. John's Episcopal church, and was one of the best loved members of that parish and the community. Three sons and a daughter survive beside the husband: Charles S. W. E., and George R., and Agnes, of this city. A son, Robert R., died in infancy. A brother, R. Summerhalder of Nauvoo and two granddaughters, Misses Mildred and Madeline Narrley of this city, are living.

Funeral services will probably be held Friday afternoon, the hour to be announced later.

LATE AFTERNOON PRESS BULLETINS

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—The circuit court of appeals this afternoon approved the plan of reorganization of the American Tobacco Co., with a few important modifications suggested by the department of justice.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—According to a crop report issued this afternoon the yield per acre of the 1911 corn crop was 23.9 bushels as compared with 27.4 bushels in 1910 and a ten year average of 26 bushels. The production of the 1911 corn crop is reported as 2,776,201,000 bushels as compared with 3,125,713,000 bushels in 1910.

The quality of the 1911 crop is estimated to be 80.6 per cent as compared with 84.5 per cent for a ten year average. The percentage of the 1910 corn crop on farms Nov. 1, 1911, is estimated at 4.2 per cent or 132,063,000 bushels as compared with 4.3 per cent or 119,056,000 bushels of the 1909 crop on farms Nov. 1, 1910.

The average weight per measured bushel of the 1911 wheat crop is 57.8 pounds as compared with 58.5 pounds in 1910 and 57.6 the ten year average. The average weight per measured bushel of the 1911 oat crop is 31.1 pounds as compared with 32.7 pounds in 1910 and 31.2 the ten year average.

Negro Mason Waived Examination and Goes to Grand Jury—Beckstrom Under \$250 Bond.

George Mason, negro burglar, waived preliminary examination in the superior court this morning and took time to plead and consult counsel. His bond remains at \$500, the amount set by the court Tuesday morning.

Charley Beckstrom, the little Swede painter, was arraigned this morning on the charge of assault with intent to commit great bodily injury. He took time to plead and upon default of \$250 bond, was returned to jail. Beckstrom, Monday, was charged with being intoxicated. He is the man who cut Guffey Getz with the putty knife last Sunday afternoon in the wall paper shop of George Leming.

Charles Clayton and Joe Miller, two young fellows, both hailing from the harvest fields near Fargo, North Dakota, were given time to get out of town this morning after arraignment for vagrancy. Both men claim their homes are in St. Louis. They arrived in town via side door sleeper last night and were arrested five minutes after they got off the train. Their sentence was fifteen days in the city jail.
