

### C. A. PLAYER AT BRIBE INQUIRY

Pearl Holycross Called Before the Lorimer Investigation Commission to Testify in the Matter.

### THE KEWANEE ATTITUDE

Boilermakers Are Opposed to Present \$100 Maximum Salary Limit in C. A.—Other Sporting News.

MUSCATINE, Nov. 13.—"Horse Power" Holycross, who captained the Camels the latter part of last season, and who is the Central Association's batting king, is enmeshed in the Lorimer investigation. During the off-season "H.P." is engaged as driver for the Danville Transfer & Storage Co., at Danville, Ill. It is believed that the Musky athlete has information that might have a bearing on the Lorimer graft investigation, the committee of which is sitting in Chicago, which he is supposed to have gained in Danville.

Holycross was summoned before the committee last week, spending four days in Chicago, waiting to be called. When finally called he was only on the stand three minutes and was then excused. He has again been served with a notice to appear before the committee. Holycross, so the investigation committee believes, is acquainted with some of the incidents regarding the story that Representative Blair of the Jefferson district has received a part of the "Springfield jackpot" to be used in furthering the campaign of Lorimer for senator.

### C. A. Salary Limit.

KEWANEE, Ill., Nov. 13.—It's hard to state just at this writing what will become of the Central Association if the directors of the league allow one Mr. Hayden, owner of the Burlington club to dictate all the policies of the league. The Pathfinder magnate has just now blocked the movement to have the individual salary limit raised from \$100 to \$125. It took only one vote to knock out the proposition and because the Burlington managers have ways of beating around the bush they put the other clubs under a handicap. It will be remembered that when the matter first came up at the fall meeting that Kewanee was the only city to vote against it. Mr. Hill and Mr. Parrish who attended the meeting saw at a glance what it would mean. Now the other magnates around the circuit, excepting the Burlington boss, have discovered where they have made a mistake.

### Football Players Liable to Typhoid.

IOWA CITY, Nov. 13.—"I am inclined to think that football men are peculiarly susceptible to typhoid fever," said Dr. Henry Albert, state bacteriologist and professor of bacteriology and pathology in the state university college of medicine.

Dr. Albert's attention was called to the prevalence of typhoid among the football players at Morningside college and the state university, without any epidemic condition among the students of the two schools, or in the cities of St. Louis or Iowa City. Six players have typhoid at Morningside, and three at Iowa.

Football comes at a time of year when typhoid is especially prevalent, increasing the danger of contagion. In their long trips, football men are liable to exposure, and the great bodily strain of a hard game finishes them. Typhoid conditions are particularly widespread this fall, according to reports received by the college of medicine, and there is no possibility of tracing the contagion in the case of the football men.

With two athletic teams partially shattered this year, coaches are apt to invite study of the subject. Vaccination of athletes probably will be resorted to in the future, but it can hardly be performed during the training season, on account of immediate effects on the men.

### HAWKEYE STATE DISASTER PROOF

Iowa Jobbers and Retail Merchants Gain by Business Reaction, Says Bolton.

Ralph Bolton in the Des Moines Register and Leader says: A summer drouth and an autumn deluge would in most states result disastrously to trade. Iowa, in addition to its other virtues, seems proof against even adverse weather conditions.

A protracted drought was experienced last summer at a time most critical to crops, and the usual crisp autumn weather has been replaced by continued rains and a rising thermometer. In spite of this, however, business has not been affected seriously and the crop yield promises to be far ahead of that of any other state that has passed through similar conditions.

It is well perhaps to point out that this relative degree of prosperity has not been shared equally by all Iowa merchants, causes for which may be peculiar to certain sections. It is well also to point out that the retail merchants who have profited most are those who have patronized Iowa markets. This statement is not influenced by patriotic fervor. It is borne out by indisputable facts.

### Buy At Home.

Within the last two or three years retail merchants have realized more than ever before the advantage of buying close at home, when their demands can be satisfactorily supplied. In the present season, when adverse conditions have had to be combated, the logic of this method of buying is more forcibly brought home.

When goods are bought from a market a thousand miles or so distant the purchaser usually places orders, even though less frequently. He buys anticipating a certain demand. Sometimes the sale for these goods comes as anticipated; sometimes trade conditions change and he is left with an overstock and large bills to meet. On the other hand, if he confines his purchases to buying for his immediate requirements from near at home jobbers, he gets his goods just when he needs them, in the shortest possible time and with a considerable saving in transportation charges. The local jobber is able to take care of orders promptly. It enables the retailer to obtain his goods quickly and he always has fresh goods from the market just when he wants them. This is the only way profits are made. A further development of this system is sure to result most profitably all around.

### KEOKUK'S CHANCES FOR STATE TITLE

High School Team Will Play Crucial Game of Season Next Saturday at Davenport After Two Week's Rest.

### ROOTERS TO GO ALONG

Effort is Being Made to Awaken Interest in Game—Victory Will Mean Lower State Title.

Keokuk's chances for the championship of Iowa or of southeastern Iowa will be definitely settled next Saturday when the crucial and deciding game of the season will be played at Davenport. Davenport recently defeated Burlington and last Saturday Burlington defeated Ottumwa, 10 to 0. If Keokuk can defeat Davenport the purple and white can justly lay claim to the title of southeastern Iowa without being seriously questioned. How big a score is piled up will have much to do with any claim on the state title.

An effort is being made to take along many Keokuk rooters and present indications are that a goodly number will accompany the team. The present week will be the scene of hard practice and heavy scrimmage during the early part of the week, but every effort will be made to combat against possible injury. The team's rest of two weeks before the game should put it in splendid shape.

### With the Big Colleges.

Football has reached its semi-final stage. In the middle west, in fact, the week end may see the championship of the "big eight" in that section decided and also may see the championship of the "big four" in the east claimed.

The Minnesota eleven, whose uninterrupted succession of victories in the central west has made that team a favorite, meets the strong Wisconsin team at Madison Saturday, and if the former wins the championship of the intercollegiate conference goes to Minnesota. If the Minnesota men lose and Wisconsin meets defeat by Chicago a week later, the three teams named will be tied for the premier honors.

The championship of the old "big four" in the east will also likely be claimed as decided if Princeton wins from Yale next Saturday, as the Tigers already have taken a game from Harvard and have not met defeat this season. Princeton's victories over Harvard and Dartmouth, however, have been by the smallest of margins, and the Tigers have twice been tied—by Lehigh and the Navy.

For these reasons and Yale's showing (all against teams which Princeton has not met), Old Eli already is a favorite for final honors. She has, however, met one defeat, by the army, but her oldest rival, Harvard, twice has been beaten by both Princeton and Carlisle. Pennsylvania has been eliminated by three defeats.

Outside the so-called "Big Four" there are several eastern colleges whose record promises some basis for championship boasts. The Carlisle Indians, who have beaten Harvard, and the West Point cadets, who defeated Yale, had not themselves suffered defeat, and if figures count for much they also have this distinction. The army, with only two points scored against it, has the best showing on
