OTTUMWA GAS COMPANY SELLS

Western Utilities Co. Take Over Properties and Say They Will Expand.

OTTUMWA, Iowa, Nov. 17.—The Ottumwa Gas, Light, Heat & Power Co. changed hands late yesterday afternoon, the property having been bought by the Western Utilities Co., a corporation with a full paid capital stock of \$500,000 controlled by capitalists from Grand Rapids, Mich., and Chicago. The Western Utilities Co. purchased all of the capital stock of the local company, the majority of which was owned by T. J. Hackworth, A. G. Harrow and Frank McIntire. The deal was made by Frank T. Hulskit, vice president, and Richard Schaddelee, secretary and treasurer of the new company. These officers, with Howard A. Thornton, general counsel for the different companies here are interested in, and L. H. Heinke, their general auditor, completed the negotiations which have been in progress for some time. J. C. Elston, formerly general manager of the Ottumwa plant, and later general manager of the gas and electric company at Waterloo, who is well and favorably known here, is one of the men heavily interested with the new purchasers. The local company will be reorganized in the near future, and an authorized issue of \$750,000 of bonds will be placed by the company. Of this amount, however, only \$300,000 will be issued, the remaining \$450,000 being retained in the treasury to be sold as the company needs money to improve and extend its manufacturing plant and distribution system. The Ottumwa plant has forty miles of gas mains and the output for

MOVING PICTURES OF POLAR BEARS

Captain Kleinschmidt Is Home After Getting Some Sensational Films.

TACOMA, Wash., Nov. 17.—Capt. F. E. Kleinschmidt has returned from the Arctic ocean with the most elaborate photographs and moving pictures ever taken in the northland. Among the pictures are views of the ever-changing Bogosloff island group and Pribiloff seal birds.

Captain Kleinschmidt was assisted by his partner, Louis L. Lane, and by Eskimos, who stood guard with rifles ready to shoot when the situation became too strained. Most of the game specimens will be sent to the Carnegie museum in Pittsburgh and the Metropolitain museum in New York.

On Wrangell island not visited since the revenue cutter Rodgers stopped there, thirty years ago, he got moving pictures that will be wonders. "We roped polar bears ashore, in water and on ice floes," he says. "We got moving pictures of the roping and shooting single, in pairs and three at a time."

Kleinschmidt said he approached within 15 feet of a big bear which stood watching the moving picture machine. He tossed a piece of walrus meat to the bear while the engineer turned the crank. The bear snarled, then began eating it. Suddenly bruln raised his head and charged at Kleinschmidt, just as the captain was on the point of snapping him with a camera. Kleinschmidt and the engineer ran, ending the pictures.
