SHOULD PRACTICE AS HE PREACHES

F. C. Overton, Keokuk Insurance Man, Suffered Fire Loss This Morning Because He Had Not Insured.

WIFE HELPED MATTERS

Forgot That She Had Turned off the Electric Flat Iron Current and Much in the Room Was Burned.

F. C. Overton, general manager of the Overton-Klein Co. and the writer of hundreds of insurance policies, suffered a \$250 fire loss today because he failed to insure some of his own household goods. In the destruction of his uninsured property Mr. Overton was abetted by his wife, whose mistake was responsible for the blaze.

The fire occurred shortly after 11 o'clock this morning in the rooms occupied by Mr. and Mrs. Overton in the Griggs' boarding house, 616 High street. Mrs. Overton had been pressing some fancy pieces with an electric flat iron. After completing the work she left the room and later returned, thinking she had not turned off the electric current. Consequently she supposedly turned off the power, when in reality she was turning it on. The flat iron thus left with the current on, drapery on the mantle and other pieces of flimsy material about the room caught fire and produced a big blaze.

Little in the room escaped without being injured by the fire. After burning nearly everything in the room which offered little resistance, the floor took fire and flames had plenty of work in saving the house. The total damage is less than \$400, according to Mr. Overton.

"It was rather peculiar," said Mr. Overton. "I have almost everything which I own insured except just what burned." This afternoon he sent the department smokes.

DISMISSED BUT JAILED AGAIN

French Roland Gets Away From the Breaking and Entering Charge But Now Faces Perjury.

WAIVES EXAMINATION

Accused of Making False Sworn Statements in Murder Trial, the Negro is Detained.

The police are taking no chances with French Roland. He was dismissed from the Justice Leindecker court Monday afternoon after it was supposed he would be bound to the grand jury. Roland was nabbed by the officers the moment he left the court room, a warrant for his arrest charging perjury having been issued during the morning in case the negro should be released.

At 2:45 in the superior court this afternoon, Roland waived preliminary examination, took time to plead and consult counsel and his bond was fixed at \$500.

Want the Negro.

Just the reverse of what was expected to be the outcome—dismissal of the case of breaking and entering with intent to commit rape, against French Roland, at the preliminary hearing Monday at 2 o'clock. It was up to Justice Leindecker to ascertain whether a crime had been committed and no evidence to convince the court that there had, was introduced in any of the testimony from state's witnesses.

Joe Tigue said that Roland had asked him for a match at midnight while standing in front of the lively stable near the restaurant on Third street. Flossie Clark, the dining room girl who was attacked while lying in her bed, by the strange man, said that Roland was about the size of the person who made entrance and exit over the shed roof beneath her window. That was as near as evidence precluding guilt of Roland, not.

All of the state's witnesses had been examined by 1:15 and on motion of John E. Crais, attorney for the defense, the defendant's witnesses were not put on the stand and the case dismissed.

Police Come Back.

Because of the past record of Roland, the police are solid in their belief that the negro should be held and some disposition made of him that
