## MUCH TO EAGLEDOM

Letter Received From Worthy State Secretary Kirkpatrick, Defines the Cause of the Gathering.

Next Tuesday in the Eagle's hall at Davenport there will be a meeting of the executive staff of the state order for the purpose of discussing work made compulsory by all of the Eagle lodges of the state becoming members of the state organizations as well as local societies.

Today, Ed. S. Lofton, worthy vice president of the state lodge of Eagles, received word to be present at the executive conference. Mr. Lofton will in all probability attend the special convocation the first of next week.

Eagles and their adherents will take interest in the letter, explanatory of the called meeting, which follows:

“You are hereby notified that a special meeting of the executive staff of the Iowa State Aerie has been called by State Worthy President Sam Swift, at Lavenport, Iowa, for the twenty-eighth of November, 1911.”

“As you have doubtless been informed by Grand Worthy President Hering in circulars 81 and 82, the state autonomy, for which we have labored so long and so consistently, is now an accomplished fact.”

“We are now a State Aerie in fact as well as name; and with the assumption of our new duties and responsibilities it becomes essential to promulgate the necessary laws and regulations as will benefit our grand fraternity.”

“It is very manifest that the proper regulations, as contemplated through the medium of state autonomy can only be made at a meeting of the executive board, where all the matters pertaining to the local aeries can be thoroughly discussed.”

“You will readily see the necessity of calling this meeting, and of your presence being required.”

“This meeting beyond exception means more to Eagledom than any similar one, ever held in the state, as the entire future policy and course of action depends upon this conference.”

## A CITY COUNCIL IS HERE TODAY

Fort Madison Heads Discuss Effect of Changed Water Condition With Mississippi River Power Company.

## DELANO DUE TOMORROW

Wabash President Will be at Head of a Number of Railroad Officials Who Will Visit the Dam.

The question of the effect of the changed water condition at Fort Madison, due to damming the Mississippi river at this point, is being discussed today at a conference between members of the Fort Madison city council and the Mississippi River Power company. The discussion today assumed only a preliminary form and a number of others will be held before the question is settled. It is understood Fort Madison will be confronted with a sewerage proposition of some magnitude, but as to other changes very little is known. Some reconstruction work along the river front will be necessitated, it is thought.

At noon the visitors were entertained at the Riverview club by Engineer Cooper and Secretary Allen and a trip over the dam was made for sight-seeing purposes.

Railroad Men Come Tomorrow.  
Word was received today by telegraph that F. A. Delano, president of the Wabash railroad, and a number of other railroad officials will be in Keokuk tomorrow for the purpose of seeing the dam. There is nothing official in the visit as far as is known. The water power company will entertain the visitors in the usual manner.

## ANOTHER BIG FIRE

AT PEORIA  
Avery Plant Is Damaged to Extent of \$150,000 Early This Morning.

PEORIA, Ill., Nov. 21.—Fire today practically destroyed the boiler shop of the Avery Co., manufacturers of farm implements, entailing a loss of \$150,000. Three hundred and fifty feet of a new steel glass and slate covered structure was reduced to ruins. Workmen say there was no wood in the structure except a few boxes and the handles on tools. There was considerable oil in the building however. The fire began at 3 a. m., from causes unknown. The Peoria fire department called by the suburb of Avertville battled for several hours before the flames were extinguished.

Fog Hard to Pierce.  
A dense or thick fog will obscure objects at a distance of 1,000 feet. The recent accident to an ocean steamer of the Anchor line illustrates the fact. An iceberg was run into as soon as seen. After the collision the passengers could hear the echo from their voices reflected by the walls of ice, though the iceberg was invisible to them. Otherwise, there are no echoes at sea.

## INSPECTOR FLYNN IS UNDER ARREST

Burlington Pure Food Man Taken In to Custody at Malvern, Pacific Junction Man Bringing Charge.

## THREATENS TO EXTORT

Action Followed Charge by Flynn that Dickerson Sold Hay Which Was Not as Represented.

MALVERN, Iowa, Nov. 21.—M. E. Flynn of Burlington, assistant state inspector for the pure food department, was arrested here charged by W. S. Dickerson of Pacific Junction with “malicious threat to extort.”

Flynn was released on his own recognizance for appearance at Glenwood for trial. Flynn's arrest followed the discharge of Dickerson in court, where he had been arraigned on a charge made by Flynn of selling hay to Burlington parties which had been damaged and was not as represented.

Both actions are unusual and highly interesting. It is the first time effort has been made to use the pure food department for prosecution in the sale of hay, and it is claimed that when Flynn is brought to trial some sensational testimony will be given.

Attorney L. T. Genung of Glenwood who appeared for Dickerson, in the so-called pure food case, contended in his argument that upon Flynn's claim a cow would be guilty of a misdemeanor if she ate hay that had not been inspected.

Indianola Will Get Station.  
INDIANOLA, Iowa, Nov. 21.—Representatives of the Rock Island railway visited Indianola and agreed with the citizen's committee on plans for a new depot, so the disagreement that was threatened between the road and the town seems to have been warded off and the best of feeling exists.

General Superintendent C. W. Jones, of Davenport and party arrived in Indianola in his private car shortly after noon, at 1:30 o'clock, met the citizen's committee and a number of others and by 3 o'clock the meeting had broken up in a love feast, each side expressing itself as highly gratified at the treatment and consideration accorded by the other. The citizens are corroborated in their belief that if they could get the authorities of the road to really learn the conditions here a satisfactory station would be erected.

## First Legal Opinion.

MARSHALLTOWN, Nov. 21.—The first opinion in an Iowa court, declaring unconstitutional the new law to the effect that possession of a federal liquor permit is prima facie evidence that the law is being violated, was given in the district court here by Judge C. B. Bradshaw, who dismissed the case brought by the state against L. F. Madden of Clemmons.

Madden had a government license to sell liquor, but the state had no further evidence against the defendant, further than the record of his license. Madden's counsel argued that the law was unconstitutional because it destroyed the presumption of the accused's innocence, a presumption that must be held until guilt is proven beyond a reasonable doubt. The state argued constitutionality on the ground of similarity to the game laws, which held that possession of game during a closed season period is held prima facie evidence of the game having been killed out of season and therefore illegal.

The state will appeal the case to the supreme court in order to get a decision that will determine further actions.

## PICTURE SHOWS

FIRE THE SINGERS  
Harold Crosby Receives Blue Slip at Quincy and Four Others Are Let Out.

Quincy moving picture shows are running matinees and nights now without their warblers, according to a story from the Herald of last night: About three weeks ago, the managers of four moving picture theatres agreed to cut out the illustrated songs in five houses, and the date decided upon for the change was the third Saturday in November. Yesterday singers of illustrated songs were not seen in any of the five houses, the terms of the agreement being enforced Saturday night when the five singers were given blue envelopes. Harold Crosby, the baritone at the Colonade for nearly a year, is to leave soon for Kansas City where he is to become a member of a company to act for moving picture reel makers. The new concern was recently organized and is to make a specialty of cowboy and western pictures. Louis Stelzer at the Savoy, is to go into vaudeville, and Mrs. Alma Knight, singer at the Gem, left this morning for Carthage to visit for a time with her parents before going to Burlington, Iowa, to sing in a moving picture theatre there. 
