—A change of venue to the justice court of John Leindecker has been taken in the French Roland case.

—A dispatch from LaGrange, Mo., says: What is the disease that is killing hundreds and hundreds of hogs for the farmers in Lewis and adjoining counties every day? It is becoming very serious, as it seems that nothing can stop the spread of this dreadful disease. When it first appeared it was in a light form and the cases were scattered over the country. But now it has grown worse and is spreading all over the country in a very bad form. At first the farmers used their old-time cholera medicine, but this did no good and the hogs continued dying every day. They sent for some experts from the state university at Columbia, Mo., who make a special study of swine and their diseases, but they, too, are like the farmers; they differ in opinion as to what is the trouble. Some say cholera, others grub worms in the head, which eat into the brain of the hog. Other various causes are assigned. However, none of their medicine or vaccination does any good, and the hogs continue dying by the score every day.

—John H. Cole, local representative of the Wabash Railroad company is in St. Louis today attending a meeting of the Wabash and Lackawanna and Lehigh and Wabash fast freight lines. —Warden Sanders has received information that there is to be a transfer of eighteen or more convicts from the state penitentiary at Fort Madison to the reformatory institution at Anamosa. The number discharged from the reformatory during the past week far exceeded the number coming in, so that the count has been on the downward road for several days, but with the beginning of court in several counties it is expected to increase again. —After bringing a suit for \$408, claimed to be due him for medical service, Dr. F. B. Dorsey of this city has been made defendant in a \$5,000 damage suit in Hannibal. Of the case the Hannibal Journal says: A very interesting case will be tried at the next term of the United States court. The plaintiff is Dr. F. B. Dorsey of Iowa and the defendants are John T. Legg and his wife, Jennie Legg. The defendants live in Williamstown, Lewis county, Mo., and the case began when Dr. Dorsey filed suit against the defendants in the sum of \$408, the amount which he claims is due him for professional services. The defendants at once filed a counter claim against the physician for \$5,000 damages. They claim that the defendant, Jennie Legg, on the advice of the physician, submitted to an operation and that her life was thereby endangered and that she suffered great bodily pain and anguish. When the counter claim was filed Dr. Dorsey had the case removed to the United States court. He is represented by O. C. Clay, Wade, Dulbar & Davis, while the defendants are represented by Hilbert & Henderson and Noah W. Simpson.
