GLASSY MEN TO HOLD REINS

Justice Says the Indicator Men in the Central Association Next Season Will Be Good Ones.

THREE OF THEM SIGNED

Contracts Announced Today—President Hill of Keweenaw Denies that Meeting is Demanded.

To travel around as a member of the Central Association staff of umpires, one must be classed as a baseball arbitrator, according to President M. E. Justice, who today gave out three of the four men who have been signed to work in the league next season.

Of the three, two are perfect strangers, while a third operated in C. A. parks as a substitute during the latter part of last season. The three men are:

John Boswell of Keweenaw, substitute last season and former Nebraska State league umpire.

Frank Augur, Rochester, N. Y., a man who worked in the New York State league and the Central league. D. Spencer of Lyons, Kansas, experienced Western league and Kansas league umpire.

President Justice declares all three of the men have good records and are really high class.

Today President Justice received a letter from Boss Hill of Keweenaw, who answered a dispatch appearing in Chicago papers to the effect that Keweenaw was demanding a meeting. While President Hill says Keweenaw is in favor of a January session, he points out that whenever Keweenaw demands anything it will be in a direct way.

CLUBS WILL SEND \$400 GUARANTEE

Must Be in Hands of President Justice on or Before January 15—\$600 Must Be Paid May 1.

OTHER BASEBALL NEWS.

It Looks as Though the "Independent" Baseball League Will Be Launched—Plans Taking Form.

Each club in the Central Association is preparing to forward \$400 to President M. E. Justice in Keokuk during the present week. The league requirement is that this amount be posted on or before January 15.

The first deposit is a guarantee that the club will continue in the league throughout the season and the second covers the contribution to the league expenses. A new rule goes into effect in the association this year by which the league does not share in the receipts at a game, all of which go to the home club. Under the old agreement ten per cent of the receipts went to the league and it is in lieu of this per cent that the new deposit of \$600 is demanded.

The meeting of the Hannibal association at which a manager is to be appointed will be held this evening, according to an announcement from that city several days ago. Magnates throughout the circuit have expressed doubts about the lone Missouri city, but word from there is to the effect that the campaign for \$2,000 has been going on nicely and the money would be raised. President Mason is very optimistic and has no doubt in the least but that Hannibal will have a prosperous year.

"Independent" League Progresses.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Plans for the United States League, the "Independent" baseball organization, are taking on form and it was announced today by Bill Neisen, who probably will hold the Chicago franchise, that a meeting of franchise holders is soon to be called. The cities represented will be Kansas City, Milwaukee, St. Louis, Cincinnati, Indianapolis and either Detroit, Columbus or Pittsburgh, beside Chicago. A 154 game schedule will be arranged and the league will start business early in April.

According to Neisen, it will be composed of semi-professional teams and efforts will be made to prevent, so far as possible, conflicting dates with the regular league teams operating in the cities covered.

Grand Leaders Lead in Team Event and John J. Crimmins is King of Them all in the Singles.

KING IN SECOND PLACE

Spectacular Shooting Forced Down by Company L Captain—Azinger Brothers Are Tied for Third.

The pennant chasing Grand Leader bowling team continues to occupy first place in the team averages, while John Crimmins, captain of the Company L quintet, has stepped into the pinnacle position in the individuals with an average of 177. Ten bowlers have an average of over 165, while eight of them equal the 170 mark or better.

The position which Captain Crimmins now holds has not been won as the result of any spectacular spurt, but by very consistent rolling. FLYNN GIVES AN INTERVIEW

Fireman Does Not Tell Public He Will Whip Johnson, but Will Train Conscientiously to Do His Best.

HAS FAITH IN CURLEY

Will Also Depend on Ryan to Learn Knockout Punch That Will Dispose of the Colored Champion.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Having signed articles to meet Jack Johnson in a final fight for the world's championship, Jim Flynn, the Pueblo fireman is taking the public into his confidence. He does not say he will whip the big negro for sure, but he declares if hard work and determination can help, he will fulfill all "white hope" dreams.

"I have all the faith in the world in my manager, Jack Curley," says Flynn. "I will be guided absolutely by him. I intend to start for Syracuse within a few days where I shall place myself under training instructions of Tommy Ryan. If any man in the world can show me how to put up an effective defense against Johnson's attack, it is Ryan. I am not afraid of the champion and I believe that when he gets some of my 'hoi-day punches' in his stomach, he will feel his title slipping. He has not fought in nearly two years, while I have been scrapping as fast as I could arrange bouts. I hope to have my match with Kubaik in Toronto called off as it may interfere with my training. I expect to have no difficulty in putting Al Palmer out of the way and that will give me the undisputed right to meet the big black as the 'logical white hope.' Don't you forget it, when the gong sounds for this scrap the sports are going to witness some fighting and I expect to have the sympathy and confidence of every four out of five men who see the battle.

Take no Stock in It.


Packey and Hogan to Meet.

Claims Featherweight Title.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Jan. 8.—Asserting that Abe Attel has never defended his title, Fred Gilmore today claimed for his Chicago protegee, Jack White, the featherweight championship of the world. Gilmore made his claim following the cancellation of the White-Attel match, scheduled for New Orleans next Sunday. According to Gilmore it was agreed that the men would weigh 122 at 10 a. m. on the day of the fight. Then Attel switched to 122 ring side and Sunday Abe announced White would have to make 122 ring side while he himself fought at catchweights. To this Gilmore wouldn't agree.

"Attel crawled out of the New Orleans fight," said Gilmore today. "Under the terms he dictates he would be champion forever."

PASTOR RUSSELL AT THE CHINESE PARIS

No Burning Hell For Heathen Mentioned in the Bible.

Rightly Understood the Bible's Message is One of Great Joy For All People—Tells That He Himself Was Once on Life's Sea Without Chart or Compass.

Shanghai, China, Jan. 7th.—The Committee of Foreign Missions Investigation seemed pleased with its reception here.

Special honors were accorded General Hall and Pastor Russell, the former because of his official position as second in command of the United States Army, the latter as the Chairman of the Committee. We report Pastor Russell's discourse:—

Pastor Russell greatly enjoyed his visit to the Chinese Paris. It was an experience he had longed for from childhood. Early in life he had inquired respecting the fate of the heathen and had received the answer that "without faith it is impossible to please God," and that "there is none other Name given under heaven whereby we must be saved" than the name of Jesus, and through faith in His blood. He then inquired the fate of the unsaved, and got the answer of all "orthodox creeds," that such would be consigned for all eternity to a place where they would suffer indescribable tortures.

Supposing that the Bible was the foundation of these creeds he abandoned the Bible, and for nearly two years was on the sea of life without chart or compass, seeking after a true God not less noble and loving and just than the very best of His human creatures.

Feeling sure that a wise, just, loving God, having made man with mental capacity to appreciate Himself, would make a revelation of His character and His purposes, he sought for a book containing such a revelation of the Divine will as his heart and head could accept. Having abandoned the Bible, he sought the teachings of other sacred books of the world, only to find them still more disappointing.

Hungry of soul, he returned to the Bible, thinking possibly he had studied it before through the distorted spectacles of human creeds. His fresh investigations brought a blessing! No where had he found so glorious a representation of the true, Divine character as in Jesus and His teachings! Truly, he said, "Never man spoke like this man!" Finally he saw the great difficulty which had blinded himself and others to the Divine love and gracious plan of the Bible.

The Resurrection of the Dead.

This discovery was that the penalty for sin is not everlasting torture after death, and that the Bible does not so teach. It declares, "The wages of sin is death;" "The soul that sinneth, it shall die." (Romans vi. 23; Ezekiel xviii. 20.) He perceived that for six thousand years the world has been suffering the very penalty which God declared to Adam, "Thou shalt surely die."

"In the sweat of thy face shalt thou eat bread, until thou return to the ground from whence thou wast taken."

He sought the Bible remedy for all this and found that no remedy could be applied only as the Divine sentence should be settled for Adam by a substitute—that then only could the curse be removed. In full harmony with all this came the Scriptural presentation that the Only Begotten Son of God had left His spiritual plane of glory and became a Man, that "He by the grace of God should taste death for every man." "Christ died for our sins, according to the Scriptures, and rose again for our justification."

Pursuing this Bible study he soon found that the hope of humanity centers in the resurrection of the dead: "As by a man came death, by a Man also comes the resurrection of the dead: 'or as all in Adam die, even so all in 'brist shall be made alive—every man in his own order,' or rank. (1 Corinthians xv. 21, 22.)"

Two Very Different Salvations.

The Pastor was glad as he thought of the hundreds of millions of patient Chinese who will have a share in the great redemption secured by the death of Jesus, and not only so, but their ancestors, thousands of millions, will also have a share for "Jesus Christ by the grace of God tasted death for every man." "He is a propitiation [satisfaction] for our sins [the Church's sins], and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world." Here are the two different salvations secured through the death of Jesus. Only one of these has yet been made effective—"ours"—not the world's. Ours is to be the First Resurrection, the world's is to be a subsequent one.

The elect Church, of which Jesus is the Head, and his saintly followers (members, will reign for a thousand years, overthrowing sin and death, breaking the shackles of ignorance and superstition, uplifting humanity out of sin and degradation to full human perfection. The earth is to be man's Paradise, which will reach perfection by the close of Messiah's reign. All who then reject this light will be destroyed in the Second Death.
