—Gate City Camp, No. 81, W. O. W.,  
 meets tonight at Hawkes' hall. A full  
 attendance is urged, as business of im-  
 portance will come up.

—The meeting of the Woman's  
 Auxiliary of St. John's Episcopal  
 church announced for Thursday af-  
 ternoon, has been postponed until a  
 later date.

—Archie Terry, who was arrested  
 by the police for fighting on South  
 Third street, was fined \$30 by Judge  
 W. L. McNamara today, but was given  
 an opportunity of leaving the city.

—The political announcements  
 made in The Gate City yesterday  
 caused considerable talk about the  
 city during the evening and today.  
 With the primaries little more than  
 two months off, the interest in the  
 campaign is expected to grow daily.

—The body of Mrs. L. M. Griffith,  
 former Keokuk resident who died sud-  
 denly in Peoria, will arrive in Keokuk  
 on the T. P. and W. train at 12:05  
 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, accord-  
 ing to word received here late yester-  
 day. The burial will be direct from  
 the train.

—With an improvement in weather  
 conditions work on rehabilitating the  
 public utilities by the Stone & Web-  
 ster company will move forward  
 much more rapidly. It was impossible  
 to do anything in the way of fast  
 work with the thermometer trying to  
 place itself out of sight.

—Several tons of ice were removed  
 yesterday from the Emporium Mill-  
 ions building next to the Masonic  
 Temple. This ice formed during the  
 time the water was thrown on the  
 Masonic building. For a time there was  
 some fear the weight might crush the  
 roof in but no damage resulted.

—The funeral of Howard Archer  
 Fellows, aged nine years, son of Mr.  
 and Mrs. Harvey Fellows of 1011  
 South Fourteenth street was held at  
 the home at 3 o'clock this afternoon.  
 Impressive services were conducted  
 by Rev. William E. Junge pastor of  
 the Redeemer English Lutheran  
 church.

—Gilbert Lee, of West Point, well  
 known in Keokuk, was in the city to-  
 day. He is now traveling for the In-  
 ternational Harvester company with  
 territory in Henry, Lee and Des  
 Moines counties. Mr. Lee on two oc-  
 casions made the race for representa-  
 tive on the republican ticket and was  
 defeated. He is well known in Lee  
 county.

—Postmaster S. W. Moorhead last  
 evening received a telegram from Chi-  
 cago requesting that he come to  
 Chicago at once, the message announc-  
 ing the serious illness of his son, Mc-  
 Dill Moorhead. Dr. Moorhead left on  
 the evening train for Chicago. McDill  
 Moorhead has been ill for several  
 days with tonsillitis. The message  
 would indicate that his condition has  
 grown alarming.

—The St. Joseph's Auxiliary will  
 hold its annual meeting at the hospital  
 for the election of officers Wednes-  
 day, January 24, at 2:30 p. m. Mem-  
 bers and their friends are cordially  
 invited to be present as at this meet-  
 ing reports from the committee in  
 charge of the children's ward and the  
 maternity room are made and the  
 general review given of the work of  
 the organization.

—Henry Manly, colored, who re-  
 sides about twenty miles down in  
 Missouri, came to Keokuk today for  
 his white wife, whom the police found  
 living with another colored man at  
 1118 Johnson street. Manly said his  
 wife deserted him and he wanted her  
 back. Mrs. Manly was brought to the  
 police station and told to either go  
 back with hubby or leave town, and  
 was given twenty-four hours to make  
 her choice.

—John Whiteside, charged with per-  
 mitting his house at 610 Palean street  
 to be used for the purpose of prosti-  
 tution, was represented in court today  
 by Attorney L. E. Williams, whose  
 first move was to apply for a change  
 of venue on the ground that Judge  
 McNamara was prejudiced in the case.  
 This morning it was not known  
 whether the case would go to the  
 court of Justice Leindecker or Justice  
 Burrows. According to law it should  
 go to Justice Leindecker, the nearest  
 magistrate. Justice Leindecker is sick,  
 however.

—The woman suffragists of Iowa  
 would know the attitude of Senator  
 A. B. Cummins, senior senator from  
 Iowa and presidential candidate, to-  
 ward the subject of woman suffrage.  
 To ascertain definitely his position  
 on this subject, a letter has been for-  
 warded to Senator Cummins asking  
 that he publicly declare his stand on  
 all suffrage legislation. In event that  
 his reply is favorable, the suffrage  
 women of Iowa, who are cooperating  
 as a state organization with the Iowa  
 Men's league for Woman Suffrage to  
 elect men to state offices known to  
 be in sympathy with the suffrage  
 cause, will pledge Senator Cummins  
 their unqualified organization sup-  
 port.

 crease—Keokuk Assessor \$25.

FORT MADISON, Jan. 23.—At the  
 annual meeting of the county assess-  
 ors held here a short time ago, there  
 was a general plea for an increase in  
 compensation. Members of the board  
 of supervisors, present at the meet-  
 ing, promised that they would look in-  
 to the matter and if possible make  
 some concessions in favor of the  
 assessors. Consequently, in session  
 yesterday, the board made the fol-  
 lowing changes in the salaries of the  
 assessors, the first column represent-  
 ing the last salaries paid and the sec-  
 ond column the new salary limit:

**Cotton Report.**  
 [United Press Leased Wire Service]  
 WASHINGTON, Jan. 23.—Accord-  
 ing to a cotton ginning report issued  
 by the census bureau, 14,519,678  
 bales, counting round as half bales,  
 were ginned from the growth of 1911,  
 to January 16, 1912, as compared with  
 11,253,147 bales in 1910.

The per cent of the last two crops  
 ginned to January 16, is 87.3 for  
 1910, and 98.2 for 1909.

Round bales included this year are  
 97,668, as compared with 111,079 for  
 1910. Sea Island included 109,592 for  
 1911, as compared with 86,424 for  
 1910.
