Engineer Shot Brakeman Whom He Accused of Wrecking His Home.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] OMAHA, Neb., Jan. 27.—F. W. Smith, a Missouri Pacific brakeman, was shot and killed as he was leaving on his regular run Saturday night, by E. E. Kountz, an engineer, and life-long friend. Family troubles are believed to have caused the tragedy.

Following the murder, which occurred after a few hurried words, Kountz, leaving his engine, hurried home where he was found in the bath tub by officers an hour later. His first words on their entrance were: "Is he dead yet?"

AT COST STORE SELLS OUT QUICKLY

It Took Only Two Hours for the People to Clean Out the Stock.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—It took exactly two hours for the first "at cost" store board in this city to run out of supplies today. The store, the first of a string which Rev. Madison C. Peters hopes to start to give the "poor a square deal and eliminate the middle man in the necessities of life," had only a small stock because its promoter did not anticipate the rush. He stated afterward that most of the goods sold went to people who showed by their clothing that they needed "bargains in food."

Supplies were limited today to vegetables and apples. Potatoes were sold at two and a half cents a pound, and beets, carrots, cabbage and turnips two cents a pound.

Rev. Peters said this evening that his plan, when in complete operation, will reduce the cost of living between thirty and forty percent. He said that he and those associated with him in the enterprise, planned to buy direct from the farmer and sell to the consumer, making the margin of profit just enough to pay expenses. The ultimate object, he said, is a municipal market.

"This is no charity enterprise," said the minister. "We simply hope that we can bring enough pressure on the greedy and unscrupulous dealers so that they will have to get out of business. Then we can get municipal markets where the farmers can come to sell their stuff and the people can go to buy. With the middle man's profit gone, the poor may be able to afford things they now consider luxuries. Members of the Professional Women's League and the Housewives League are working with us and before we are through we will compel the city government to aid our crusade."

FRENCH REVOLUTION TO BE REPEATED

Conditions in Mill Town Where Strike is on Are Compared With France

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] LAWRENCE, Mass., Jan. 27.—Likening the conditions of the mill operatives here to the French peasantry prior to the French revolution, Strike Leader Joseph J. Estor, said tonight that the strikers are fully aroused and will remain firm.

"We are like the peasants of France. The mill owners are the aristocracy. Remember what the French aristocracy pulled down on itself and it is figuratively similar to what the mill owners will get from the workmen who grind out their lives for shameful wages." Strike leaders say they will not even talk arbitration unless the mill owners come to them.

FIT CANDIDATE FOR PENITENTIARY

Horrible Cruelty to Little Five Year Old Girl, Beaten to Death.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Jan. 27.—William Goetter, a laborer and his wife, Regina, are being held by the police here tonight pending an investigation of the death of Goetter's five year old daughter, Nellie, Thursday. The couple are suspected of having been responsible for the baby's death.

Coroner Hoffman found that the child's feet were badly burned, it's body was a mass of welts and bruises. The little girl, it is said, also was a victim of a loathsome disease.

The police assert that Goetter's three other children, boys aged 15, 14 and 6, have testified that the baby was frequently beaten with a whip made from a bicycle tire and that on occasions was punished by having hot stove lids applied to the soles of her feet.

CHINESE FURY BREAKS OUT TOMORROW

War Resumed on Monday With the Manchus Calling for Help.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] PEKIN, Jan. 27.—It was learned tonight that the terrorist who fatally injured General Liang Pi with a bomb today made his escape and the story that he had been killed was falsely circulated by the Manchus. General Liang was reported to be unconscious tonight and it was believed that death was a matter of only a few hours.

The police received information that several bomb factories were operating in Pekin and it was believed that the revolutionists had agreed on a terrorist campaign. A number of suspects were arrested.

Several clashes between revolutionists and imperialists were reported from the south today. The republicans were said to be moving northward in anticipation of a resumption of the war on Monday, when the armistice expires.

Chinese newspapers today continued to assert that the Manchus were frantically appealing to Japan to step in and save the dynasty.

HE NEVER WILL BE ELECTED

Candidate for Governor Has Great Plans on How to Run Penitentiary.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 27.—"If I am elected governor, I will turn the penal institutions of the state into schools," said Stephen M. Reynolds, of Terre Haute, nominated for governor of Indiana by the state socialist convention here late this afternoon. "I will put the prisoners on parole at public work, but not under contract, and I will have them taught until they are ready to take their place in society. Then I will pardon them."

Two women were given places on the state ticket. Miss Florence Wattles was nominated for state superintendent of public instruction, and Mrs. Carl Ott was nominated for state statistician.

Hands Off of China.
