cally all of the ore fields except those led by various steel companies. The Longear and Bennett firm entered with Hill into the lease to the steel corporation. No ore has been taken from the Longear and Bennett properties, but the Hill properties have been mined and royalties paid on the ore taken out.

"Now why should the steel corporation mine your ore and not that of Longear and Bennett?" demanded Stanley.

"I could only give my own opinion," said Hill, "and that would be that my mines were more convenient."

The United States Steel corporation cancelled its lease of the Hill ore fields because their officials were "just scared to death," said Hill.

"I should think the steel corporation with their \$1,500,000,000 in stocks and bonds, would be anxious to have an ore reserve that would last for forty or fifty years; I would, if I was in their place," Hill observed at one point in his examination.

"Then why do you suppose they cancelled the lease of your ore land?" demanded Stanley.

"I think they just got scared to death. They lost their nerve. They just went white," and Hill stopped to chuckle to himself.

"Why?" asked Stanley.

Hill was at a loss, and Attorney Reed for the steel trust interrupted: "Because the departments of the government were camping on their trail?"

"I do not know of any one camping on the steel corporation's trail," said Stanley sweetly. "And surely the steel corporation is not among those the Good Book says 'Flee when no man pursueth'."

In reply to questions by Representative Gardner, Hill said that at the rate of consumption of 35,000,000 tons a year, the ores of the Lake Superior field would be exhausted in thirty years. Stanley asked the grizzled railroader about the statistics in the bureau of corporations steel report, indicating over-capitalization of the steel trust.

Hill grinned at the figures and could not conceal his contempt for conclusions which the bureau's experts drew.

"I started to read that report," he declared, "but I found that it was so far from the facts as I had found them in my experience, that I did not complete it."

A storm of questions followed, and finally Hill had to admit that maybe the report was true, "but the conclusions were not." Asked to point out inaccuracies Hill said:

"I am not an expert. You can get men who have given their lives to the study of this question who know it better than I do."
