

Hamilton's New School House



After considering a number of different plans the Board of Education has selected one which they feel fully meets the needs of this city.

The building will be entered through two separate doorways from the front, this being best suited to its location.

The first story will contain five classrooms for grade work and a room for the school library.

The second story will contain two rooms for grade work, an assembly room for the high school, having a seating capacity of one hundred twenty-five students, three recitation rooms for the high school work and an office for the principal.

All class rooms will have, in connection, a well-lighted wardrobe room and the high school room will have two wardrobes.

A very complete system will be installed for the heating and ventilating of the building, insuring fresh air in all rooms at all times.

The basement, which will be only partially under ground and which will be lighted with large windows, will contain boys' and girls' play rooms and toilet rooms, coal room, boiler room, laboratory room and a large gymnasium. Entirely separate stairways and halls lead to boys' and girls' quarters. The gymnasium will be fitted with a stage and dressing rooms and will be used for lectures, class plays, etc. It will have a seating capacity of two hundred and fifty and will thus serve the purpose of both gymnasium and auditorium.

The exterior of the building will be of a dark shade of vitrified brick with trimmings of stone, and the design shows a building very attractive in appearance.—[Reprinted by courtesy of the Hamilton Press.—Ed.]
