ing love," a white rose, "symbolic of purity," and a small American flag, "for patriotism" in each grave. The final prayers were read by Chaplain Chidwick.

Out from the dripping shadows slowly moved a company of marines. The clear tones of the band rang forth in the solemn strains of "Nearer My God to Thee" and the three sharp volleys—the tribute of heroes—sounded across the graves of the men who met their death in the steel walled pen of a battleship, without even the glory of battle. The marines stepped back and from the long hills away in the shadows, came the dull, muffled roar of a battery, firing the 21 guns of the national salute for the second time. The last expression of a nation's grief—the melancholy notes of "Taps"—then sounded from the grove of evergreens.

A hush that lasted fully a minute swept the big crowd. Then, president, diplomats, dignitaries and soldiers turned away, the dull lumbering of the returning caissons came through the drizzling rain. Out from the shadows crept a squad of blue-overalled grave diggers, with spades under their arms. As the last of the caissons rolled from view; the last automobile carried away the last dignitary, the dull sound of the red clay clouds falling on the pine boxes beat the last tattoo.

As the first clouds fell, the "little sister of the Maine," sorrowing for an "unknown" brother, turned back for a long, last look.

Back in the city flags were half-masted after a funeral more imposing than any since the martyred President Garfield was borne away. All Washington paid tribute. The departments were closed. Congress halted its work. Traffic was stopped. Bells tolled as the cortege wound its way along Pennsylvania avenue, and bared heads of a multitude that lined the thoroughfare, silent in their homage, paid eloquent tribute. The procession first passed slowly to the beat of muffled drums and funeral marches from the cruiser Birmingham to the navy department. There were assembled 20,000 people who heard President Taft pay brief but eloquent tribute to the dead heroes and poignant memories voiced by Chaplain Chidwick, former chaplain of the Maine.

"These our honored dead were hurried into eternity without the inspiration of anticipated battle or hope for victory," the president said. "They were on duty when they went down; they wore the uniform of our beloved country; and they are to be classed

Massed in front of the president and his cabinet, foreign diplomats, senators and plain people were the mute reminders of the dead. As the president spoke the last reverent word the national salute of 21 guns boomed out.

Then the Maine's unknown dead were carried on their last journey to Arlington.

Alaskan Coal.

FOND DU LAC, Wis., March 23.—Governor Woodrow Wilson addressed an audience of 1,000 this afternoon. He was tumultuously received. He attacked the policies of the republican party, asserting that it had for years been clinging to dead issues, and asserted that many of its leaders had been high priests of the doctrine of retrogression.

The Taft administration he characterized as wobbly and vacillating and pointed to the fact that there were thousands of tons of coal piled on Alaskan wharfs, which could not be utilized by the people because the administration had not yet decided what policy in regard to the Alaskan coal fields would best further its own interests.

NEGRO LYNCHED THIS MORNING

Shot Policeman Down and Got Quick Justice When Mob Broke Into Jail.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DALLAS, Texas, March 24 (Sunday).—George Hunter, a negro who shot a policeman at Fort Smith, Ark., was caught by a mob and lynched in that city, last night. The lynching occurred at 12:15 this morning. I. Carr arrested a negro woman for an offense and was on his way to the jail with her when Hunter interfered, asking that the prisoner be released. This was refused. There was further argument with the officer as he proceeded toward the jail. Reaching a rather unfrequented street the negro drew a revolver and shot the officer down. Brother officers quickly arrested Hunter and he was placed in jail. At midnight a mob stormed the jail. Several unsuccessful attempts to gain entrance were made before finally with the aid of timbers the iron barred doors were battered down and the negro dragged out and lynched.
