

A WINDY CITY STRIKE PROBABLE

Union Garment Makers Meet Today to Consider Strike Against One Firm.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, June 1.—A mass meeting of the 5,000 union garment workers employed in the plant of B. Kuppenheimer and Co., one of the largest clothing manufacturing concerns in the country, will be held tomorrow to consider a complete strike against the firm. There were 500 cutters and trimmers out on strike now, claiming two reductions in wages, and they will make an effort to induce the other union workers to join them. It is planned to extend the strike to other clothing houses, if the demands for better working conditions and immunity from further wage reductions are not granted by Kuppenheimer.
