

OLD SANITARIUM AT HAMILTON

Many People Homeless When Old Landmark in Illinois City Burns to the Ground This Morning.

KEOKUK DEPARTMENT

The Furniture in the House is Saved but the Building is Completely Destroyed—No Cause Given.

The old sanitarium at Hamilton was completely destroyed by fire of unknown origin this morning. The fire was discovered in one corner of the roof by one of the occupants about 10:45 o'clock and the alarm was immediately sounded, but the flames spread so rapidly that nothing could be done to save the building.

Several Families Homeless. The building was occupied by a number of water power employes and their families, who are made homeless by the fire.

The sanitarium was built many years ago by Dr. Dodge, who advertised the place all over the country on account of the healing qualities of the water from several springs and wells on the place.

When it was found that the Hamilton fire department could not handle the fire on account of the lack of sufficient hose, the Keokuk department was asked for help and the chemical engine, the hose wagon and the old steamer were sent to the scene.

Large Exhibits and Interesting Track Program Expected to Attract Many.

The announcements are out for the Lee county fair, which will be held at Donnellson, August 21, 22, 23 and include a list of the officers and premiums that will be given. R. The fair this year will be the fifty-ninth annual fair held in the county and the management will spare no effort to make this one eclipse all former ones and make it the best in the history of the county. A fine exhibition of live stock, farm products and other things interesting to the agriculturists of the county has been promised and on Thursday and Friday an excellent track program has been arranged.

Entries in all classes except the races will close August 20 at eight o'clock, at which time all exhibits except cattle and horses must be on the grounds. It is stated by the directors that no game of any kind that is questionable in character will be allowed to run on the grounds and that they intend to keep the fair clean.

HECTOR CAUGHT HIM IN HONG KONG

But Don't Know What to do With Him Now That He Has Him.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] HONG KONG, July 19.—Hector Fuller, ex-war correspondent, who has for weeks been trailing Jordan Lawrence Mott, Jr., heir to the millions left by his grandfather, founder of the Mott iron works of New York, overtook the latter here today.

Fuller was engaged at a high salary as a kind of guardian for Mott, but the latter gave him the slip some time ago and shipped from New York as purser on the tramp steamer Indradeo, bound for China, May 18. On the same boat there sailed, booked as stewardess, to evade the anti-passenger carrying law, an actress, to whom it was believed Mott was attached. The former war correspondent gave chase and arrived at successive ports in the Mediterranean, the Red Sea and the Indian ocean only a few hours behind his quarry. It is uncertain, however, what he can do with his man now that he has caught him. Mott says he is going to settle in Japan.

Montenegro Aroused.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] VIENNA, July 19.—Montenegro is reported mobilizing several thousand troops today in retaliation for a Turkish invasion of its territory and the alleged murder of several Montenegrins. Montenegro adjoins Albania where a rebellion is in progress against Turkish rule and when chased by Turkish soldiers, the rebels frequently seek refuge on the Montenegrin side of the frontier. It is presumed this accounted for the Turkish invasion.

Catlin's Final Fight.

MILLER CAPTURED IN THE COUNTRY

Man Who Shot Pretty Stenographer Admitted Committing the Crime.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] DENVER, July 19.—Hatless and collarless, his clothing mud covered and terribly cut from barb-wire fences, Eugene Miller, who last night lured to a vacant lot and shot Georgiana Lichtenwaller, a 19-year-old stenographer, because she would not elope with him, was captured before noon today on a ranch in Arapahoe, seven miles southeast of Denver.

Miller was searched by his captors and a bottle of carbolic acid, found in his clothing showed he did not propose to be taken alive. News that his victim was not dead caused him to delay drinking the poison, he said.

Chief of Police O'Neill says Miller made a statement in which he described his movements after the shooting and admitted that he took the girl to the vacant lot with the intention of killing her. He said when she jilted him he could not stand it.

As soon as he was brought into the city Miller was taken to the hospital and confronted the wounded girl. As soon as he was brought to her bedside, the girl, who had recovered consciousness an hour before, murmured her forgiveness and told the police they had the right man. While Miller stood by the girl gave the details of the shooting, declaring he had shot her without warning and without provocation; that he had asked her to turn her head and then shot her while she was looking away from him.

While the girl was telling the story, Miller stood calmly by without a trace of tears in his eyes. Chief O'Neill declares the man admitted to him that he was sorry he had not killed the girl instead of merely wounding her.

The party of converts and Rev. T. E. F. Low, assisted by Rev. S. D. Keene, of St. Louis, and Rev. Frank E. Bartelman, of Los Angeles, Calif., will march in solemn state procession from Homestead Park where the annual convention has been in session for two weeks, to the river banks.

GAS EXPLOSION IN BASEMENT

Little Baby Killed and Scores of People Injured in Panic Which Followed.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ST. LOUIS, July 19.—Five men were required to restrain Alexander Bettis from attacking John S. Adelsberger, postmaster, banker and deputy coroner of Dupo III, following a gas explosion in the basement of the Old Fellows' building at Dupo, which killed Bettis' 9-month-old baby, injured Mrs. Bettis and a score of others, according to F. I. Marks, one of the speakers at the Dupo meeting who today described the events following the explosion.

Odd Fellows succeeded in quieting Bettis while others in the hall attempted to restore quiet among the panic-stricken crowd.

A brawny man had blocked the only exit from the hall by stepping in the doorway. "My wife's in the crowd," he yelled, "and you can't get out till I get her." But he was swept out of the door by 150 men, women and children who fought to gain the exit.

The explosion occurred when the lights in the hall became dim and Adelsberger endeavored to fill the tanks.

Bomb Explosion.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] BARCELONA, July 19.—Wholesale arrests are being made today on account of yesterday's explosion of a bomb in the plaza de Catalonia as King Alfonso's aunt, the Infanta Isabel, was passing. The authorities fear the outrage marks a renewal of revolutionary violence in Barcelona, which is normally one of the most turbulent cities in the world, though the big anarchist colony there has been comparatively quiet for some time past.

Investigate Forest Service.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—Investigation of the forest service was proposed in a resolution introduced in the senate today by Senator Overman, (dem., N. C.). The measure leaves the probe to a special committee of five senators.



NEW YORK, July 19.—Security prices continued to rule firm today in spite of considerable offerings of stocks on the advance and the sensational news from the Dardenelles. So little has been heard of late concerning the progress of the war between Italy and Turkey that the markets were quite unprepared for the news of the attack which resulted in the destruction of the two Italian warships. On this news there was a quick rise in wheat prices here and abroad, but the movement was soon checked at Chicago, where crop advices continued to be highly reassuring. From various sections came reports of an increasing movement of new wheat, while preparations for the harvesting of spring wheat were progressing so favorably as to insure the actual movement of the crop in many sections of the country within a week or ten days. The foreign security mar-

MUST PAY CASH TO SEE BULL MOOSES

Tickets to Roosevelt's Convention Are Not to Be Given Away Free.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, July 19.—Today's mail at the progressive republican headquarters here boosted the sale of seats for the coming convention. Several checks and money orders arrived from over the country, the largest being for \$1,000 worth of seats.

The local committee arranging for the convention today predicted that the demand for seats would be greater than could be accommodated. The plan of selling the seats outright, instead of giving away a certain number of seats for a campaign contribution of a certain figure, was declared to be a success. The best seats in the body of the hall are selling at \$20, next best 15 and others \$10. Delegates seats only are free.

Tewfik Accepts.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CONSTANTINOPLE, July 19.—Tewfik Pasha, the Turkish minister in London definitely accepted the post of grand vizier today. He will begin the formation of his cabinet at once. The sultan gave him an entirely free hand. Tewfik assumed office with his country at war against Italy, Albania in rebellion, nearly the whole army mutinous, the people on the verge of revolt against the government and an empty treasury.
