

Surprise was expressed when the Burlington's June statement showed an operating deficit of \$163,628, compared with a normal surplus of \$1,200,000. The reason was an increase in maintenance of way and structure expenses of \$1,504,000, or 120 per cent. Carried along on this basis for the year, the Burlington would have spent about \$4,000 per mile on maintenance of way. What it did was to throw into the month the many expenses that might legitimately have been charged out through the year.
