—The Iowa weather crop bulletin for the week ending Sept. 15 is as follows: The first two days were very warm, but the latter half of the week was cool, with temperatures near the frost line in the northern counties on the morning of the 14th. More than the usual amount of cloudiness prevailed, and showers were frequent, although the southeastern part of the state received very little moisture until Saturday night when heavy rain fell. Corn made very satisfactory progress, and the early planted fields, in the southern counties, are now being cut for silage and fodder. The abnormally high temperatures during the first ten days of the month caused corn to mature rapidly, and probably fifty per cent of the crop is safe from a moderate frost, but the late fields need two to three weeks of good warm, dry weather to put them beyond danger of injury of even a heavy frost. Considerable corn was gathered for seed during the week, and most farmers will probably secure their seed at the earliest date possible.

—The annual Christmas bazaar of St. John's Guild will be held Thursday, December 5.

—John O'Neill, deputy revenue inspector, of Des Moines, was in the city today on his way to Keosauqua. Mr. O'Neill denied that he was here for the purpose of looking into the illegal sale of liquor in Keokuk, and said that he was merely stopping off here to see a few of his friends.

## MILITARY FUNERAL FOR THE DEAD

Recruits Who Were Drowned Sunday Are Given Their Last Honors.

WAUKEGAN, Ill., Sept. 17.—A military funeral service was held today at the United States naval training station for six of the young men who were drowned Sunday when a sailing launch containing twenty-four apprentices overturned off Lake Bluff. Those for whom the services were held were J. L. Lindsey, of St. Louis, Mo.; W. E. Anthrobus, of Indianapolis; John Wallace, Turner, Ind.; R. C. Harlan, Bloomington, Ind.; Walter E. Southworth, Pittsburgh, Pa., and F. F. Winkler, Chicago. Preparations were made after the ceremonies to ship their bodies home at the expense of the navy department. The parents of John A. Patton, Canton, Ohio, and Walter E. Negus, chief gunner's mate of Attleboro, Mass., who died trying to make his third rescue, have not yet been heard from.

Three apprentices were still missing today. They are L. R. Field, Sorento, Ill.; W. W. Woodward, Warsaw, Ind., and J. W. Bauld, Beardstown, Ill. Sailors from the training station and soldiers from Fort Sheridan were patrolling the beach in the hope of locating the bodies of the missing three.

The board of inquest appointed by Captain W. M. Fullam, commandant at the station, found that no one was to blame for the accident. Further investigation will be made within the next few days by a court of inquiry appointed upon orders from the secretary of the navy.
