NEW RATES OF BUTTER BOARD

Will Not Fix a Price But Will Give Out Quotation of the Call Board.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] ELGIN, Ill., Dec. 18.—The rules adopted by the new administration of the Elgin Board of Trade for fixing the price of butter went into effect today. Under them the only butter quotation to be issued will be the price that butter is sold for on the call board.

President C. H. Potter explained that this would mean that the average figure of transactions on the floor of the board would regulate the butter market for the week.

"In other words," he said, "this means that the laws of demand and supply will govern this commodity as they do all others, which is what our faction has contended for all along."

Deputy U. S. Marshal E. R. Davis today served summons on Potter C. Brown, secretary of the board, and J. P. Mason, one of the directors, to appear before the federal court the first Monday in February to answer the government's suit.

Joseph Newman of Elgin, leader of the disgruntled members of the board, who walked out of the meeting yesterday when the quotations committee was abolished, has called a meeting of producers for next Monday to discuss the organization of a rival board of trade.

PROGRESSIVES TO BE RECOGNIZED

Regular Republicans Are on the Run Since Report is Heard From Dunne.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—A report that Governor-elect Edward F. Dunne will follow Cook county authorities in recognizing the progressives as the minority party brought republican leaders on a run today. Intimate associates of the new governor say he has already decided to recognize the new party in minority appointments on state boards.

Roy O. West, chairman of the republican state committee, paid a visit to Dunne regarding the report, but was given no definite reply. He was told that the republicans would

get "due consideration" in appointments. The official recognition of progressives by County Judge Owens in the make-up of election machinery in Chicago for the coming year will mean election jobs for 8,200 adherents of the new party. The election patronage will be divided equally between progressives and democrats, leaving out republicans entirely.

New Style of Rating.
 [United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—The old system of rating pitchers by the number of games won and lost is to be abolished in the American league. Ban Johnson, president of the league, said today he had put some of his experts to work to figure out a fairer scheme.

Some method based on the number of hits allowed off each pitcher's delivery or the number of earned runs scored off him will be substituted. Johnson says this will represent the strength of the pitcher himself and not the team behind him.

Secretary John A. Heydler of the National league a few weeks ago computed the standing of the old league's pitchers on such a basis and is said to have arrived at a much fairer line-up. His method may be adopted.


