After an infield and an outfield error had been made by the Indians yesterday, Keokuk delivered a ten inning game to Ned Egan and the Packers. It was a tough one to lose and the big Saturday crowd felt keenly what had taken place in each one of the rounds.

Since George Pennington came to Keokuk laboring under the impression that he had a bonafide release from the Kewanee ball club, and then was sent back there again by President Justice when it was found he was still a ballplayer, Manush had to switch his lineup which can be partly blamed for the loss of the game.

Not a two base hit was made off Ed. Wahl until the tenth inning when things went up for Keokuk. In that final frame when every move counted because of a tied score, Tommy Ronan booted one that came to him on an easy drive. Lorenzen lived and was sacrificed to second by Kensel. Senno up next sent a blinger down through third base and Frank Kline made the effort of his life to get in the way of the pill but all in vain. The crowd thought Pat Hilly had the ball in left but the blamed thing hit his glove and then moved on some thirty feet farther. Lorenzen scored and the business was at an end. There were two men out when Jack went to bat in the tenth for Keokuk but the little back stop peeled off a double. Boss Manush sought to drive him home but tipped off two or three fouls and in waiting for a groover, stalled too long and was out on the third called strike.

"Lefty" Lorenzen, the pitcher most feared in the Ottumwa ranks since Burle Grimes was sent to Chattanooga, was pitching for the visitors. Seven hits were made off him in the game and eight from Wahl's delivery. McGaffigan was the first man to hit and score for Keokuk, getting a single through short in the second inning. Mac stole second on the failure of the second baseman to stop a throw when he was running to the sack, he reached third. Hilly hit to right for a double and the "elt" scored.

The second run came in the seventh. Kline got a base on balls; Seneff sacrificed to the pitcher; Wahl was out on a grounder to the second baseman; Jack hit to left and Manush through first base, scoring Kline. It was the seventh inning before Ottumwa found Big Ed for two bingles in the same inning. Wise, the short stop of the Packers hit to left for one base; Schliebner fanned; Holly flied to Miller and Chapman singled between first and second. Wise scoring. Chapman was out on a fielder's choice when Lorenzen hit to short.

In the eighth Kensel hit in Kline's territory, but it was too hot for the third baseman to handle and the Ottumwa found life on the blow. Senno sacrificed; Link flied to McGaffigan and House singled to center, Kensel scoring.

Fleming is censured. An unpleasant incident of the game,

happened in the fourth inning. McGaffigan, the first man up in the round, bunted a tiny one not a half foot off the plate. With a deer like movement, Mac tore off toward the initial bag while Chapman was fumbling around with the ball. The little short stop ran on to the bag at first knocking Schliebner back and as he did and sprawled clear over the Ottumwa player's shoulder, ten feet away from the sack. Manush rushed over to McGaffigan as he got up, thinking the lad had hurt his shoulder again but luckily no damage was done. When McGaffigan started back to the bag after having over run first, Schliebner touched him with the ball while he was still three feet off and the ump called McGaffigan out. There was a roar from the stands and Fleming was called for a seeming piece of dirty work.

Joe Jenkins who was on the field in uniform, went to bat in the tenth for Seneff who was playing right field. Jenks had his eye with him and spoiled two or three good ones, but was unable to get one past the center fielder on a fly.

Jack was on third base in that last inning, having trotted over there on a passed ball after getting his double. The sudden break in the team's usual lineup, it is believed, had more to do with the loss of the game than anything else. If Pennington gets back today and Jenkins is in behind the stick again in a day or two, it will help things back to their normal shape and the Indians will be ready for another winning spurt.

SHINNERS TOO MUCH FOR THEM

Indian Batters Couldn't Find the Muscatine Hurler Master During Friday Session.

FRENCH WAS POUNDED

Several Triples, Doubles and Singles Did the Work in Giving Boyle the Last Game.

Keokuk's heavy hitters couldn't get to new man Shinners from Muscatine on Friday and the game went to Frank Boyle's Sterlings, 5 to 2. Shinners held the Indians hitless until the sixth frame when French was walked, Jack got a scratch hit and Manush blew for a base. The local pitcher scored and so did Jack when the Musky short stop failed to handle a ball, thrown from the box to catch the sub back-stop running to second. It began to look about that time like the locals would rally and win despite the lead of four runs but the fact could not be accomplished. Miller was the only man to get a blow after the sixth inning.

Curtis, who was the first man at bat for Muscatine stepped into one of Winnie French's ins and sent the ball into deep right—deeper than it had ever been planted on the home lot before. He would have been out at the plate had Jack held onto the ball when it was thrown in but in the excitement of things, the little guy let the round thing tumble, Fleming reversed his decision and called the man safe, which he was.

Hart and Shinners scored in the second frame. The catcher walked and the hurler got a three base poof into the much-favored right garden. Curtis singled, bringing the pitcher in for a score.

SENEFF TO PITCH, WHITTAKER IS ON

PENNINGTON MAY COME

Didn't Have Release From Kewanee and Ordered Back But Plays With Keokuk Today.

Seneff and Whittaker are the likely candidates for the box this afternoon in the double header with Ottumwa. Manager Manush decided this yesterday when he ordered Wahl into the pulpit and played Seneff in right field because of Pennington's absence from third. Kline played that bag again. Manush told Whittaker to go to bed early last night so as to be in shape for today.

Jenkins will not be able to play today, although it was thought several days ago that he would catch one game of the double bill. When he turns on his right leg, it still pains him and the doc thinks it best that the back stop lay off for another couple of sessions.

Pennington May Return.
Briefly and for the information of those who do not know of the situation, it may be said that Pennington was not released by Kewanee and when he came here to sign and played three games with Keokuk, he was really Kewanee property. Pennington claims that he did not know that he still belonged to the Hugh Hill club after he was given his release as manager.
