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WEATHER THOUGHTS FOR THIS REGION

The Warm Weather Wave Predicted Failed to Arrive Here on Schedule Time.

COG WORKED WRONG

The Warning is Given That a Light Frost May Visit Us Tonight in Low Grounds.

That warm weather wave which was promised to come a few days ago, must have passed through an iceberg before arriving here or else the weather wheel slipped a cog and sent the wave whirling around in some other region, like the vote at election times in the back districts, the returns from which have not yet been received. Rains have visited this vicinity the past week. There were showers Monday night and Tuesday and a slight rainfall Wednesday amounting to about 36 one-hundredths of an inch, and Friday night there came another rainfall continuing all through the night, which amounted to a precipitation of 80 one-hundredths. The rainfall during the week, including all these rainfalls amounted to a total of one inch and 29 one-hundredths. Noting the weather conditions: The depression from the western plains, moving eastward, was central near Chicago Saturday morning and its advance was marked by general rains from the Missouri river to the Atlantic coast. The northwestern field of high pressure was followed rapidly, and covered the northern plains, where the weather was fair and cooler, the temperature falling below freezing point in northern Montana. It will be better to look out for the safety of flowers and tender shrubs in this locality, as the conditions indicate fair, cooler weather for this section tonight and Sunday, with light frost in the low grounds tonight.

Will Have Good Wharf and Warehouse, Making Town Able to Care for River Traffic.

Hamilton, which has been placed on the map as a river town since the completion of the dam, will get a gift from the power company that will enable it to attract river business.
