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## HIGHWAY COMMISSION AT FORT MADISON

State Board Will Select One of Three Roads as County Thoroughfare.

The state highway commission with A. Marston, chairman, is at Fort Madison today to umpire a dispute over the location of the county road from Fort Madison to West Point. Supervisor Young went to Fort Madison this afternoon to confer with the state commission in the matter.

There are three roads running out of Fort Madison to West Point. The county supervisors decided upon the middle road as the one to be designated as the county highway. This brought protests from the people living on the other two highways and petitions were sent to the county board against such action. The board of supervisors in such cases when they cannot decide which road to designate have the privilege of calling in the state highway commission.

The county members notified the commission of their dilemma and yesterday word was received that the commission would go to Fort Madison to look into the matter. The decisions of the state highway commission in the dispute will be final, and whichever road they designate will be the one chosen for the county highway.

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## DAMAGES OF \$2,900 ASKED BY LINEMAN

James Pares, Injured When Pole Breaks, Brings Action for Large Amount.

A suit was filed in the office of the clerk of the district court today by James Pares, against the Keokuk Electric company, claiming damages in the sum of \$2,900 for a fall when a pole broke while he was working at the top of same.

Pares claims in his petition that he was engaged in helping reconstruct the trolley wire system of the Keokuk Electric company's last August and that on August 25, he had to climb a pole opposite the gas works. He claims that while he was working on the pole, thirty-five feet high, and strapped to it by his lineman's belt, for safety, the pole snapped off and he was thrown to the ground with it.

He alleges that one wrist was broken and that his other wrist and an ankle were sprained, and that he suffered other injuries. He claims that the company knew the pole was not in perfect condition, and that therefore it is negligent.

He asks judgment in the sum of \$2,900 and costs of the suit. A suit for divorce was filed yesterday by Kate Easley against Warrie Fasley, charging cruel and inhuman treatment, and asking that her maiden name of Kate Payton be restored. Judge Hamilton granted the petition, and signed the decree of divorce.

Big Christmas Mail. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—The first incoming Christmas mail steamer from Europe, the American liner St. Louis, arrived here today with the record breaking load of 8,261 sacks. The Lusitania is due tomorrow with 7,548 sacks and Saturday the Latorame and the America are due with 1,555 and 1,120 sacks respectively; and on Sunday 1,425 more sacks will arrive at the George Washington.
