

QUIT CLAIM DEED TO CHURCH LAND

Rev. James Davis, Bishop of Davenport, Conveys Property in City to St. Peter's Catholic Church.

MANY OTHERS RECORDED

Several Thousands of Dollars Are Involved in Instruments Conveying Lee County Property.

A quit claim deed was filed with Ed. G. Vaughan, county recorder, today, in which the Rev. James Davis, bishop of the diocese of Davenport, conveys to St. Peter's Catholic church of this city, a piece of land at Second and Timea streets and a piece of land out in the county. Lots 5, 6, 7, 8, 9 and the west 10 feet of lot 10 in block 121, compose the property at Ninth and Bank. Lots 1, 2, 3 and the rear five feet of lots 4, 5 and 6 in block 141, compose the property on Ninth and Timea streets. The rear 46 1/2 feet of three lots at Second and Timea streets also are conveyed in the deed, and ten acres off the north side of the south half of the west half of the northeast quarter of section 25, township 65 north, range 5, are included in the instrument.

James E. Farrell and wife have conveyed to Dan Haffner, 188 acres of land in township 67, for \$16,920.

David Abel, Sr., and wife have conveyed to J. H. Abel, 160 acres in township 67, range 7, the consideration being \$13,600.

W. G. Snider and wife and B. F. Allen and wife have conveyed to L. C. Kelley a strip of land in township 67, range 7, the consideration named in the deed being \$15,625.

Eighty acres of land in section 24, township 65, lying east of Susar Creek were conveyed to Jesse H. Nelson by Henry Meinhardt and Fredericka Meinhardt for \$1,850. The same property was sold to Charles Bennett by Jesse Nelson and wife for \$4,000.

James S. Hawkins and wife conveyed to Isaac Carrick land in section 32 and 33 of township 66. The consideration was not named in the deed.

Edward Ebinger and wife deeded to James McCarthy portions of land in sections 28 and 29 in township 65, except the right of way of the railroad. In another deed filed, James McCarthy and wife convey to George J. Loomis the same property, and the grantee assumes a mortgage of \$7,000, according to a note added to the deed.

A deed was also filed by F. W. Andrews, administrator of the estate of Perline Cheesman, in which lot 11 of block 30 in Montrose was sold to William Adams. The sale was made at a private sale, and the consideration is \$150.

BRASS TAGS ON CONGRESSMEN

To Identify Their Bodies in Case of Explosion Down in the Mine.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] WALSENBURG, Colo., March 3.—The story of Andrew Colmar, striker, that militiamen forced him to dig his own grave after telling him he was to be executed, was one of the principal matters to be investigated when the congressional strike probe committee opened its hearings here today. It is expected the local hearing will last two days. The strikers' attorneys have temporarily withdrawn their request that "Mother" Mary Jones be examined. She may be called later, however.

As Representatives Byrnes, Sutherland and Evans were entering the Delagua mine yesterday on a trip of inspection, a man stepped up to them and handed each a little brass tag, numbered. "What are these for?" inquired the visitors. "They are given to everybody entering the mine," said Superintendent Snodgrass. "They will identify your bodies in case of an explosion or other accident."

The statement was swallowed rapidly, but went into the mine. Clad in greasy overalls and wearing miners' caps, they remained in the mine for several hours, interviewing miners and watching the men at work.

Henry Scovern Dead. CARTHAGE, Ill., March 3.—Henry Scovern died at his home here Sunday night at 11 o'clock, from paralysis. Mr. Scovern suffered a stroke last week which affected his right side, and the next day had another stroke which affected the left side, rendering him helpless.

Philadelphia Dog Show. PHILADELPHIA, March 3.—Some of the best known dog fanciers of the east had entries in the Kennel club of Philadelphia's third annual dog show which will continue tomorrow and Thursday.

PLUMBING CODE BEING DISCUSSED

Housing Committee of Industrial Association Considers Needs Along This Line and Plans Ordinance.

TREE TRIMMING ALSO

Pruning of Trees in Parking May be Uniformly Done According to Present Plans.

The proposed plumbing code for the city, also a proposed regulation to govern the trimming of trees in parkings were discussed by the committee of the Industrial Association yesterday afternoon. The plumbing code will be drafted into the form of an ordinance, and after further conferences are held, may be presented to the council.

The housing committee of which H. S. Walker is chairman, has the new plumbing code in charge. The code was approved by local plumbing firms before it was taken up in committee. It will embody nothing radical or overly stringent.

The code was discussed yesterday, and then it was decided that it would be drafted into ordinance form, and more people interested would be invited to consider it, and then it will be submitted to the council.

The department of city affairs has under consideration a plan to regulate the trimming of trees on the parking in the city. The Nolan plan will provide for narrower streets, lighter paving and more parking, where travel is not so heavy. In order to get the best results from the trees both as to looks and shade, a uniform method of trimming them is being considered.

It will be necessary to devise some method of uniform planting of trees on wide parkings, also, if the best results are to be obtained. All of these things the department is now considering and will take up later in some detail. The work of the department along the tree line will be carried out through the streets and alleys committee and the parks, playgrounds and public improvements board.

It is getting the time of the year for the spring clean-up, and tree trimming, and the department expects to have something definite to report in the matter shortly.

POLICE CHARGED WITH BRUTALITY

Accused of Treating Striking Waitresses in Rough and Abusive Manner.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] CHICAGO, March 3.—Investigation of charges that policemen have been guilty of brutality in arresting waitresses picketing Henric's restaurant, and that private detectives were permitted to crowd the sidewalk in front of Henric's while girl picketers were forced to move on, was demanded by Alderman Charles E. Merriam. While a council committee was considering Merriam's resolution today, Miss Ellen Gates Starr, 54, and a co-worker of Miss Jane Addams at Hull House settlement, was waiting to be arraigned in police court on the charge of disorderly conduct. Miss Starr was arrested while standing with a group of girl picketers. She remained in a cell for two hours before agreeing to accept bail.



RAIL COMMISSION TO CARRY HEAVY BURDENS

Matter of Granting Rights of Way to Electric Power Lines, One of Important Questions.

DES MOINES, Iowa, March 3.—At an early date the railroad commission will undertake to decide what can be done and ought to be done under the new Iowa law which gives to the commission the authority to grant rights of way in the country to electric power lines for transmission wires. The hearing at that time will be in regard to a small line from McGregor to Monona; but it will afford opportunity for discussion of some of the general

phases of the subject.

The law itself is going to impose on the railroad commission very heavy burdens. The commission has already considered three important cases and there are three others on file to be acted on. Yet the commission is without facilities for making investigation into the various questions that are to come up. As soon as the development of electric-water power has become general the work of the commission in this regard will be great. The telephone companies are raising objections to the running of these high power lines all over the state. They expect at the March hearing to bring out expert testimony showing the interference of the high power current with telephone lines. The

proposed line in Clayton county would cross two telephone lines. The electrical workers are also interested and have asked to be notified of any hearings that might be had on any of the various transmission lines, presumably on the theory that spider-webs will make it dangerous for persons engaged in handling wires.
