—Fort Madison is urging the voters of that city to give substantial support to the proposition of increasing the school facilities of that city. The same emphasis could justly be put on the same question for Keokuk where better and more school facilities are needed.

—February of this year was the coldest February in Iowa for nine years with one exception, that being February, 1912, which averaged a tenth of a degree colder according to Dr. Chappels governmental records at Des Moines. The month was also cloudier than usual.  
—The state public utilities commission of Illinois yesterday adopted an order requiring all steam roads in Illinois after May 1 to maintain bulletin boards announcing the time of arrival and departure of every passenger train. Passenger agents will be required to post the bulletin at least thirty minutes before each train is due.
