**Japs Take Precautions.**  
WASHINGTON, March 13.—Japan is moving its subjects in Mexico to prevent not make trouble for the United States. Officialdom today placed this construction on the action of the Nipponese in moving 160 or more Japanese from Juarez and Chihuahua to Calexico, on the west coast, controlled by Huerta. With this transfer it is believed most of the territory dominated by men of the Villa type. The real reason, it is declared here is that Japan does not desire a repetition of the Benton incident. The present Japanese administration has recognized Huerta. Its men on its warships have paid high tribute to the federals. Villa has declared and Carranza has not repudiated his utterance, that friends of Huerta are enemies of the revolutionists. The result has been that grave fears have existed in Japan that Villa or some of his fiery subordinates might commit an outrage on a Japanese subject. If this should happen then Japan would be compelled by force of public opinion to demand instant reparation. If Carranza should maintain the position he adopted in the Benton case, the result would be very embarrassing both to Japan and the United States. At the white house and state department today knowledge was denied of any additional note being sent to Huerta. Bryan denied he had sent any new communication to Charge O'Shaughnessy to be delivered to the dictator. He insisted that he did not know where the report originated. The secretary of state continued to maintain his reticent attitude on all foreign matters but he was most emphatic in denying he had under contemplation any note of any character to the Mexican government.

Despite this denial, it was stated at the Mexican embassy that the Huerta government had the "best of authority" for expecting a new note from the government and that in part at least it was expected to be an answer to the recent note of President Huerta to the powers, protesting against the raising of the embargo on arms for the benefit of the constitutionalists.

**Another Embargo Expected.**  
MEXICO CITY, March 13.—The Mexican foreign office today let it be known that it expects tomorrow a note from Secretary Bryan in regard to another embargo by the United States on the importation of arms into Mexico. Nelson O'Shaughnessy, American charge d'affaires, refused to discuss the matter. Foreign Minister Flores declined to go into details.

Tampico hospitals are filled to capacity with wounded federals, according to a report today from the beleaguered oil port.

**Huerta Recruiting Again.**  
[By a United Press staff correspondent.]  
MEXICO CITY, March 13.—General Huerta's recruiting methods today were exemplified again by wholesale conscriptions in the suburbs. Hundreds of men were seized in the streets and locked up until they could be provided with uniforms and rifles. They were then pronounced "soldiers" and sent to Cuernavaca, where Zapatas were reported to be operating. Huerta also impressed men from the Mexico City prisons, some of them desperate criminals in jail for serious offenses. Nothing definite was known here today regarding the fighting near Torreon. The war office admitted a report that the constitutionalists captured Aguas Calientes and that another rebel force was moving on Piedras Negras. It was said that fighting was still in progress near Torreon.

**Making New Pennies.**  
CHIHUAHUA, March 13.—Copper centavos will be coined from the statue of Enrique Creel, ambassador to the United States under Porfirio Diaz, which for years stood on a marble pedestal in the Plaza Hidalgo. The statue was discovered by constitutionalist soldiers hidden, where it was placed by federals when they evacuated Chihuahua in November. Mayor Bracamonte was notified and at once ordered the statue sent to a foundry to be melted up for coinage. It was erected by citizens in Chihuahua a short time after he was appointed ambassador to the United States, and was made abroad by a noted French sculptor.

**MILITIAMEN AND STRIKERS CLASH**  
Trouble is Expected if Miners Persist in Threat to Restore Tent Colony.

TRINIDAD, Colo., March 13.—A clash between southern Colorado coal strikers and militiamen guarding the strike zone is threatened today as the result of the announcement of determination of strikers to restore the Forbes tent colony, recently razed by the militia.

General John Chase, commanding the militia, declared today he would not permit the re-establishment of the colony under any circumstances.

### MAY RESIGN

Persistent Rumors That He will Give Up His Position Because of Home Rule.

LONDON, March 13.—Persistent rumors that Premier Asquith would resign as a result of the Irish home rule turmoil were heard today. The report was strengthened by the fact that David Lloyd George, chancellor of the exchequer was spokesman for the cabinet in the conferences with Irish nationalists who are objecting to the government making a too sweeping concession to Ulster. Also, the prime minister's announcement that he would on Monday next in the house of commons make a full exposition of the home rule tangle, made the public believe that something momentous is impending.

It is conceded that the life of the liberal government hangs in the balance in the home rule fight. If Asquith cannot maintain his position in the controversy and satisfy the country, the ministry's fall is most likely.

### NOT DICKERING WITH CURTISS CO.

Wright Denies That Aeroplane Patent War is About Ended.

DAYTON, Ohio, March 13.—"The Curtiss company is seeking cheap publicity in sending out such reports," declared Orville Wright, vigorously denying that negotiations were about completed for a settlement of the aeroplane patent differences between the Wright Aeroplane company and the Curtiss company.

The inventor admitted that proposals in behalf of the Curtiss company were made in New York a month ago, but added:

"They wanted to make an exchange of patents giving us some of their exclusive designs for the use of ours. We did not see the proposition, as we do not need any of their patents. Until this company settles up for the past there will be no time wasted in discussing a settlement affecting the future."

### TEST ALL SEED CORN AND OATS

"Farmers Should be Alive to the Question of Good Seed," Declares St. Louis Grain Club.

With the time for planting and sowing again drawing near, the farmer naturally begins to wonder where he is to obtain his seed for this year's crops. If he is a careful farmer he will test carefully every ear of his seed corn and will also take samples of his oats and see for sure that a goodly percent of them will grow in order that he may be insured of a "stand."

The St. Louis Grain club gives a very good method of testing seed, either corn or oats. This method, although simple, is very effective. Any boy can make the tests and he will find it not only interesting but educational. The test is as follows:

Use a piece of cheap domestic, a flour or wheat sack, or old table cloth, about 36 inches long and 12 inches wide. This is size for testing six ears of corn (enough to plant one-half acre). Spaces for seed, four inches square, numbered the same as the ears for identification.

Wet cloth and wring moderately dry. Take two grains from tip, two from center and two from the butt of the ear and place in proper square. Turn up the lower third of cloth, then hold seed firmly in place and prevent mixing.

Run this around a well moistened core (a strip of cloth about four inches wide and long enough to make a compact roll one and one-half to two inches thick). Then bury in a bucket or box of damp sawdust or sand and place in a moderately warm place for five days.

Its condition will then determine the advisability of using the corn for seed. Use your common sense. You know vigorous root and stalk sprouts. Take no chances on weak vitality.

The same method with but slight modification may be used in determining the germinating quality of oats. (Of course, less time is required.)

Oats seeding is so near at hand that a farmer can do no more now than test his seed and sow enough additional per acre to make up for low vitality.


