
## PREDICTS WINNER AMONG FEDERALS

## MUSKIES' UNIFORMS JUST LIKE GIANTS'

Natty New Costumes Hoped to Inspire Players—Home Uniforms also Very Handsome.

MUSCATINE, Iowa, March 16.—The new uniforms of the Muskies have arrived here and are on display in the window of the Reeder company on East Second street. The costumes which will be worn on the road are exact duplicates, except in the name on the shirts, of those worn by the New York Giants. These are a soft dark gray in color and have alternate blue and red stripes. The caps are of the same material and have dark red visors. Across the bosom of the shirts is the word Muscatine, the letters being maroon and the shading of dark blue.

The home uniforms are also an extremely handsome set of outfits. Instead of the plain white uniforms with black borders that have been the lot of the Muskies since breaking in organized ball, a little touch of life has been added to the home costumes. They are of white but have dark blue stripes and the visors of the caps are of dark blue. The stockings of the two sets of uniforms are the same, dark blue with a four-inch white band around them. The Muskies will be the distinction of being the only club in the Central Association with uniforms resembling those of the New York Giants and the fans here are hoping that the uniforms will prove an inspiration to the players to emulate the little play-fellows of the great Muzzey McGraw.

D. 1914, adopt a resolution No. 602, extending and fixing the boundaries of the said city of Keokuk, Lee county, Iowa, a copy of which resolution is hereinafter set out; and

Whereas, It is provided by law that the question of the said extension of the said city limits shall be submitted to the vote of the electors of the said city as thus proposed to be enlarged; and

Whereas, The said city council has fixed the 30th day of March, A. D. 1914, as the date of the special election, at which said question shall be submitted to the said electors;


