—The following item is from the Quincy Herald: Captain H. D. Parmelee has a letter from Capt. Hugh McKenzie, written at Keokuk, requesting him to report for duty on the 28th inst. Captain Parmelee is to be mate on the Carnival City Packet company's steamer "Keokuk" during the coming season, and will enter upon his duties at Davenport, where the boat is at her moorings.

—The following interesting piece of railroad news is from the Nauvoo Rustler, and revolves an old rumor that the B. & O. is seeking a line into this section. The Rustler says George Zern of Adrian, was a caller last Thursday. He is the gentleman who purchased the former Farmer Reimbold residence property in Nauvoo from Argast & Bicker on a farm deal. Mr. Zern thinks Nauvoo has a splendid future. He informed us that surveyors for the B. & O. R. R. were at work in the vicinity of Adrian, headed for Nauvoo from Beardstown, and that the above road contemplated an extension of its line west to our city with a possible new bridge spanning the river here. This is the rumor at Adrian. Nauvoo is on a direct line west from Beardstown to the Mississippi river. No better location could be found on the Mississippi river for a bridge than right here.
—Here's the first of the season's snake stories from the Nauvoo Independent: Last Saturday afternoon Hi Scott, Henry Argast and Joe Schilson discovered a "snake den" up near the old Wiegand quarry above the steamboat landing. They dug the reptiles out and succeeded in killing fifty-four of them. They were of nearly all species common to this vicinity, large and small, and had crawled into a hole in the rocky earth there to hibernate for the winter. Several other snakes were killed in the vicinity at the time. It is said there are an unusual number of snakes in this vicinity since last summer. The backwater from the dam drove many of them off the islands.
