### Where the Akhund Rules.

Swat is the name of a valley and petty state northeast of Afghanistan. It takes its name from the River Swat, the Scostas of the ancient Greek geographers—an indirect tributary of the River Kubul. Its people belong to a race called Yusufzal. Akhund is the title of their rulers. The old line of princes, which till a comparatively late time ruled in Swat, claimed descent from Alexander the Great.
