INFORMATIONS ARE FILED BY FLYNN

State Pure Food Inspector Files Two Against Consumers Wholesale Supply Company This Morning.

BUTCHER SHOP IS HIT

Pfaffe Brothers Also Charged With Infraction of Law—Others May Follow During the Day.

M. E. Flynn, state pure food inspector, is in the city. He is making his presence here known by a number of informations, some already filed, and others promised, in the local justice of the peace offices. Mr. Flynn filed two informations against the Consumers' Wholesale Supply company, and one against Pfaffe Brothers, early today. He intimated that he would have other informations to file before the day was over.

The first information against the Consumers' Wholesale Supply company, and C. E. Alling, manager, charges that company with not maintaining its store in a clean healthful and sanitary condition in relation to the displaying of the following commodities, dates, figs, dried fruit, honey, fish and bakery goods. The information charges that the method of displaying these goods is unsanitary, and not complying with the law.

The second information against the Consumers' Wholesale Supply company charges that they sold to M. E. Flynn linseed oil meal in violation of section 5077 a-10 of the commercial feeding stuff law. He charges that the law was violated in that it did not have affixed to each bag or parcel the inspection fee tag as required.

The information against Pfaffe Brothers charges that they violated the pure food law in exposing for sale in an alleged unsanitary manner, boiled ham, pork sausage, bologna and weinerwurst.

Mr. Flynn was making inspection trips in various parts of the city today. He intimated that he might have additional informations to file during the day, if he found that the law was being broken by any of the dealers.

Coal Dealer in Trouble.

This afternoon Inspector Flynn filed an information against William Mulliken whom he charges with selling coal by other than weight, which is contrary to the statute, and by not having a ticket to show the weights. Mr. Flynn found that Mulliken was selling coal by the dollar's worth, he stated this noon, and immediately filed an information. The law requires that coal shall be sold only by weights, and that tickets must accompany the loads to show the gross and net weights. These tickets were not being used, either, the inspector charges in his information against the local dealer.

The information was filed about one o'clock and Mulliken was to be arraigned later this afternoon.

Others Plead Guilty.

In the court of James S. Burrows this morning, the Consumers Wholesale Supply company pleaded guilty

to both charges against them and were fined \$10 and costs in each case. Pfaffe Brothers entered a plea of guilty in Justice Leindecker's court and were fined \$10 and costs.

It is generally believed that the local stores will not allow this infraction to occur again, and that the suggestions of Inspector Flynn, and the omissions which caused the filing of the informations will be remedied at once.

Flynn Compliments Stores.

"Your stores here generally are a hundred per cent better than last fall when I filed those wholesale informations against them," said Inspector Flynn at noon today. "I walked into like new places. If they will just I had to file a charge last fall, and I was surprised at the change. Believe me, the stores, some of them look like new places. If they will just keep up the good work now I'll be satisfied."

The inspector says the next thing now is to get rid of the rats in the stores. He suggests that proprietors take special pains with this pest, and clean out their stores.

The merchants will be allowed to display garden truck in their stores, such as radishes and onions, without their being under dust proof covers. Berries, however, must be under dust proof covers or the department will be forced to prosecute merchants who do not protect this commodity.

Warsaw, Ill., March 20, 1914.


