### WABASH ENGINEER MEETS TRAGIC END

Frank Clark is Killed When He Steps in Front of Switch Engine.

Frank Clark, an engineer on the Wabash railroad, running between Keokuk and Bluffs, was instantly killed Thursday evening about 10 o'clock at Bluffs, when he stepped down from the cab of his own engine and on to the track where a switch engine with a drag of cars was running. He was instantly killed when the switch engine threw him under the wheels.

According to the reports of the accident here, Clark had been noticing trouble with the air on the engine in which he was in charge, and when he stopped he took his torch to go around the engine and to investigate the cause for the trouble. He was so interested in his own work, that he paid little attention to the surroundings. It is believed, and failed to see the switch engine.

The switch engine was pulling two cars at the time of the accident, and Clark was struck and dragged in under the cars and the engine. When he was taken out from under the train it was found that he was dead.

Clark's funeral will take place today from Clayton, Ill. Men from Keokuk and Bluffs are planning to attend the services, which will be at 2:30 o'clock. Two special trains will be run, one leaving Keokuk at noon and the other leaving Bluffs at the same time.

Clark was married and is survived by his wife. He was forty years old.
