ADVISES AGAINST CONTRIBUTIONS

Superintendent of Louisville Associated Charities Replies to a Local Inquiry.

One of the merchants of Keokuk questioned the advisability of the citizens contributing to the American Home Finding association and asked that an investigation be made. The American Home Finding association has placed in many of the business houses of this city, small drum-like arrangements for the reception of coins.

In answer to inquiries made of the Associated Charities of Louisville, Ky. where the home is located, the following letter is received:
Louisville, Ky., March 21, 1914. To the United Charities, Keokuk, Iowa. Dear sir: We would advise you not to contribute to the National Home-Finding association. They have a small orphanage here, but there is no reason why they should solicit outside of Louisville.

JOHN W. BOND DIED THIS MORNING

Was Born in Keokuk and Made His Home Here During His Entire Life.

The death of John W. Bond occurred at 905 Blondeau street, at 12:30 o'clock this morning, after a brief illness, since Thursday. Mr. Bond was well known here where he was born twenty-nine years ago the twenty-second day of last May and he resided here all his life.

On the 19th of February five years ago he was married to Miss Mamie Remington, an attractive young woman who is sadly stricken over his sudden passing away in the prime of his young manhood. Only a few days ago he was apparently in his usual health; today he is asleep in that eternal land from which there is no earthly waking. Mrs. Bond's mother Mrs. Geo. Lee of Quincy is here to comfort and console the young widow, all unused to scenes of death.

Mr. Bond was a member of Eagle lodge No. 12, A. F. & A. M., and of Keokuk lodge No. 13, I. O. O. F. He was a nephew of Capt. William Adams and Owen Adams, well known steamboat men of this vicinity.

The funeral will be held at the funeral parlors of I. S. Ackley at 2:30 o'clock where short services will be held, to be concluded at the grave, according to the rites of the Masonic fraternity. The burial will be private. He is survived by his sorrowing young widow, his parents and a number of other relatives who have the sincere sympathy and condolence of hosts of saddened friends.

FOR WIDE OPEN OR CLOSED TOWN

Political Fight in Sioux City Centers Around Police Department.

SIoux CITY, Iowa, March 23.—With the entire interest in the campaign apparently centered around the candidacies of R. H. Burton Smith and John Dineen, both aspirants for the police department on the issue of a wide open town or closed town, the home stretch sprint began in Sioux City's third commission plan election.

So keen is the fight between these two candidates that even the red hot battle between Mayor Smith and

former Councilman Jonathan W. Brown, is taking a back seat.

This week will be filled to the limit with campaign meetings, some of the candidates making as many as a half a dozen speeches today and when the votes are counted next Monday night the tally on two candidates alone is expected to record the wish of Sioux City voters on the open town proposition.

Burton Smith led the fight on the fifth ward election frauds last year and John Dineen, while not avowedly for a wide open town, has a record for liberal ideas when he was chief of police some years ago.
