HUNGARIAN BIRDS ARE TURNED LOOSE

State Game Officials Hope That This will be Starter for Colony.

The Hungarian pheasants which arrived from the state game warden Saturday, have been given the keys of Lee county. Warden Middendorf and Sheriff Joe Datin liberated them in flocks of twenty, west of West Point on Sugar Creek and on Mud Creek near Bill Geff's place, says the Fort Madison Gem City. The birds which are quite wild took to the brush like whirlwinds as soon as liberated.

This Lee county is assisting the state of Iowa in starting colonies of game birds and in preserving the pitiful remnants of the native birds which formerly made the meadows and marshes of Iowa team with life. This is just a starter. The authorities, the land owners and the true sports are hoping that this little colony will make good in spite of the

SCHOOL DISTRICT WOULD GROW TOO

If City Limits Proposition Carries, the School Lines Will Automatically Enlarge, It Has Been Declared.

IS COVERED BY LAW

Problem of What to Do With the Pupils in White Oak and Valley District is Pending.

That the proposed extension of the city limits, to be voted on next Monday, will automatically enlarge the Keokuk school district some square miles and require some new country school houses in this Keokuk district—and that if the city ever contracts again, this territory will remain in the school district practically forever—was brought out by a visit of County Superintendent Lynn to this city last evening.

In conversation, Superintendent Lynn mentioned that enlarging a city automatically enlarges its school district, but contracting a city does not contract the district. The law is in section 2793 of the code emphasized by a supreme court decision found in the 120th., Iowa 119.

Affects Two Country Districts.

This presents some difficult and peculiar problems in school management. The proposed city limits extended go far beyond the present limits of the independent school district of the city of Keokuk. The new city, if the proposition to extend the limits carries, and the new Keokuk district, will include part of what is now the White Oak school and the Valley school districts. Children there can no longer attend the Valley or the White Oak school and must be provided for by the Keokuk district—the state law compels provision for convenient schooling for all children.

Keokuk school officers say that this means new school houses out there, within the new limits, or else transportation of pupils into Keokuk at the cost of the district. Price's Creek and Hilton schools are not situated to accommodate the new residents of the city, if the limits are extended as planned, they say.

Same Thing in the Past.

This brings up some interesting history of similar character.

Back in 1857, the city limits were farther out than now and later were brought in to the present lines. This left two and a half square miles of country inside the Keokuk school district but outside the city. This country territory is cared for by the Hilton and Price's Creek schools which have been a worry to the Keokuk board of education for years.

They cost out of all proportion to the attendance or the value they give the pupils. They can not be disposed of, for Jackson outside persistently refused to take them, and they can not be detached without the consent of that outside board of directors. The peculiarity of the school law is, that territory is acquired without any action by the boards but can not be detached without the consent of both school boards concerned.

The probability that the enlargement of the city will enlarge the territory, cost and troubles of the Keokuk school district for all time is worrying some of the school officers of Keokuk, they say.

LOOKS LIKE R. I. INVESTIGATION

Chairman Adamson Notifies Green of Hearing of Rock Island Railroad Affairs.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24.—Representative Green was informed yesterday by Chairman Adamson of the house committee on interstate commerce that a hearing would be given by the committee Tuesday on the Green resolution for an investigation of the Rock Island railroad.

While this does not necessarily indicate that the committee will order the investigation, the probabilities of an inquiry are believed to be strong. Judge Green will go before the committee today and make a statement regarding the financial jugglery of which the Rock Island property has been the victim and regarding the condition of the road. He has collected a mass of data and has much more information than when he made his recent speech in the house.

One Term for Vollmer.

WASHINGTON, D. C., March 24.—Representative Henry Vollmer may not seek reelection in the Second Iowa district, according to high authority here.

Mr. Vollmer was elected to succeed Representative Pepper only after a sharp fight, and as viewed here he is certain to encounter a much harder one if he runs again.

COUSIN OF T. R. IS VISITOR HERE

Nicholas G. Roosevelt, Distant Relative of Bull Moose Leader, Stops Over Here on His Trip.

MAKES TRIP OVER DAM

Asks Many Questions About Keokuk and Says He Hears it is a Growing City.

Nicholas G. Roosevelt of New York is in the city. He admits the soft impeachment that he is a relative of the colonel's. He says, however, that he is only a distant cousin of the bull moose leader who is now in South America. Mr. Roosevelt's visit here was business, not political. He is not in the political game. He is here in the interest of a big Philadelphia company, and this morning made a trip over the dam and power house.

Mr. Roosevelt is a representative of the firm of Day & Zimmerman. They are experts who doctor factories when those institutions acquire the spring fever in their operating systems, and don't turn out the dividends they should. His firm also helps factories already on a good basis to acquire the maximum of efficiency.

Mr. Roosevelt was here on his way from one of the big plow factories in the west, where he has been looking over the ground and will report on the way in which this business can be enlarged. He stopped over in Keokuk to view the big power house and dam, and to talk over the industrial situation with the Industrial association officers.

Mr. Roosevelt bears some of the family resemblance which is familiar to everyone who has seen the pictures of the strenuous member of the family. He does not have the prominent teeth, however. The forehead and eyes show some resemblance to the other branch of the family, however.

The visitor expressed no small amount of interest in Keokuk this morning. He inquired if this brand of weather was the usual kind, or if it were a special order. He asked about the population, and said that he understood the city was a growing one.

There are traces of the big blizzard still left in the east, according to Mr. Roosevelt. He said that was one of the biggest storms the east has had to battle with for some time. Mr. Roosevelt was furnished with passes over the power house and dam this morning and spent the time looking over the big engineering feat in the river. He was greatly impressed with what he saw.

Mexico, brought to light the fact that there were certain members of the Catholic party in Mexico who were receiving extensive favors from Victoriana Huerta, Mexico's dictator, and who, in return for these favors went so far as to lodge charges of meddling in politics against Archbishop Mora del Rio, the charges being placed in the vatican itself.

On first hand information the United Press correspondent is able to explain the activities of Archbishop Mora del Rio, which formed the basis of the charges at Rome. About the first of December the archbishop began a campaign of persuasion among Huerta's friends with the object of endeavoring to persuade Huerta that he ought, for the sake of his country, to step out of office. This campaign was highly effective for a time, so much so that he felt inclined to leave the presidency, in accord with the wishes of President Wilson, and take the field himself in northern Mexico. It was only by the utmost persuasion that Huerta's friends, whose financial and political

interests were at stake, talked him out of the idea. Archbishop Mora del Rio's argument was a strong and simple one, as it reached the ears of Huerta through his friends and as Mora himself told it to Huerta one evening when the president called at the archbishop's home. "Huerta has done the best he can," declared the archbishop. "Yet the situation grows worse and worse. What a magnificent place Huerta would take in Mexican history if, to save bloodshed and to hasten peace in Mexico, he would declare to President Wilson, 'I have done my best but I am not strong enough to bring peace amid so much tumult and such conflicts of selfish interests as prevail here. I step down from my high office, with the understanding that you will take the responsibility of settling affairs in Mexico and putting the country again at peace.'"

Undoubtedly if Huerta had followed the advice of the archbishop, President Wilson would have been placed in a highly embarrassing situation for, to bring peace, it would have been necessary either to support Huerta's personally conducted fight against Carranza or to support Carranza and oppose Huerta, even after Huerta had put President Wilson under obligation by resigning his dictatorship. On the whole, it is believed in diplomatic circles, it is very fortunate for President Wilson that Archbishop Mora del Rio's plans were not carried out.
