—Did you forget to vote at the last presidential election? If you did, you will have to be registered before you can vote at the city election next Monday.

—Your last opportunity to register is next Saturday, unless you were absent from the city during all of the days the registration boards were in session.

—Wednesday was everything that could be desired of a spring day. Everybody enjoyed it and many were busy, as the gardens and the lawns are beginning to receive attention, and there is work for many.

—A marriage license was issued late yesterday afternoon to Jesse Ewing Ottaker, 38, and Goldie Mae Hull, 22, of Adams county, Illinois. The couple were married about 6:00 o'clock last evening by James Burrows, justice of the peace.

—Farmers have practically quit coming to town. That is, the farmers who farm. Work in the fields has begun in earnest. There were men out in the fields everywhere along the main line and the branches of the Burlington route yesterday.

—Were you surprised when you found that you weren't registered when you went to the polls primary day? Well, then don't get another surprise election day, Monday, March 30. See to it that you are registered. Saturday is the time to get your name on the books.

—If your name isn't on the poll books you still have a chance Saturday. Registration places will be open all day.

—N. C. Roberts, publisher of the Fort Madison Democrat, has been appointed postmaster. It was a foregone conclusion that the place would go to Mr. Roberts, who has been an active worker in the democratic party for many years. Fort Madison has had a good postmaster and in Mr. Roberts will have another.

—The registrars will again be in session at the respective meeting places the coming Saturday. If you have changed your place of residence, or have acquired the right to vote since the last election, you should register in order that you may have an opportunity to vote next Monday. It is a good plan to call, if in doubt, and make sure that your name is on the list.

—Last chance to register before election, Saturday. Boards will be in session all day Saturday.

—Iowa soon may be confronted with claims asking for rebates on hunting licenses. At Waterloo several local sportsmen who paid their dollar for hunting licenses, supposing they would entitle the holder to the right of spring shooting of ducks, have threatened to institute actions of some sort. They will ask rebates of fifty to seventy-five cents on the license.

—Registration boards will be in session all day Saturday, so you can be sure that your name is on the poll books.

—Prospects for big crops this year are particularly bright at this time as the result of the almost continuous succession of snow storms over the country in the opinion of officials in the federal department of agriculture. The longer the snow blanket lingers the more frequent it is replenished, they declare, the more grows the assurance of gigantic crops of corn and wheat, better vegetables, more stock food and lower prices. During February and March general snow storms have been more frequent than for years, it was pointed out.
