Despite frequent intermittent showers, the high school baseball squad managed to get a fairly good workout at the baseball park yesterday afternoon. A large number of candidates for regular berths on the team have turned out already, there being two or more contesting for every position.

(By Hal Sheridan, written for the United Press.) NEW YORK, March 27.—Organized baseball finds itself facing another pretty little wrangle today. President Dave Fulz, of the baseball players' fraternity has donned his war paint and promised the great fathers of the diamond sport, a battle to the finish.

SHERIDAN is nettled and incensed over the national commission's construction of section 18 of the Cincinnati peace pact. Fulz today promised to carry an appeal to the commission, and if regressed is not granted, organized baseball may face a strike on the part of the players' fraternity.

Southern Association Protected. According to the commission's position, section 18 would not conflict with the old method of returning drafted players. In other words, a drafted player could be returned to class A clubs without class AA clubs being given a chance to get him.

Signor Ruffo is shown in the accompanying photograph seated at the right of the table in the act of signing a contract with Mr. W. K. Ziegfeld, representing the Chicago Musical College. Mr. Ruffo came to America two months ago at the solicitation of his brother and is teaching exclusively at the Chicago school, where among his pupils are included the most astute professional singers of the city and a score of the best vocal teachers as well. During the past few years the advancement of music in America and the rapid development of a superior brand of vocal teachers has made it possible for students to secure thorough artistic training in this country, and while local educators admit that we are yet too young to have developed many advanced teachers of voice, we have in a measure counteracted this defect and secured from Europe the most famous and capable teachers of the old world capitals. In fact concert artists of international fame from the music centers of Europe have commented freely upon the ability of American institutions to secure the services of the best European teachers because of the good salaries to be secured here. Mr. Ruffo is a composer whose works have had production in Italy, and a brother of one of Italy's most famous poetesses.

## GENERAL ORDINANCE NO. 435.

An ordinance prohibiting the erection of dwellings and other buildings within fifteen (15) feet of the property line on residence streets in the city of Keokuk. It is ordained, by the city council of the city of Keokuk, Iowa, Section 1. That from and after the passage of this ordinance no dwellings or other buildings shall be erected within fifteen (15) feet of the property line abutting on any residence street in the city of Keokuk, Iowa, unless permission therefor shall be granted by resolution of the city council and unanimously adopted.
