POPULAR RESIDENT DIED YESTERDAY

Well Known Young Business Man Passed Away in the Vigor of His Useful Manhood.

DEATH OF J. T. MURPHY

The shadows of gloom and sorrow have again gathered about the Murphy home at 913 Exchange street. John T. Murphy died at 3:40 o'clock Saturday morning at a local hospital for treatment for abscess on the bladder, whence he had been taken a few days ago.

There is a peculiar sadness in this case, as his mother, Mrs. M. L. Murphy, died only last Sunday evening at 9:30 o'clock while the son who is now dead, was lying on a bed of sickness in the same house. They resided in the same building and no mother and son were ever more affectionately attached to each other. Visitors, even his nearest friends, were not allowed access to his sick chamber, lest a reference to the dear dead mother would add to his bodily affliction and endanger his chances for recovery.

His mother ever had a firm hold upon his sturdy and loyal manhood. His filial affection was as true and tender as mother love, and he has soon followed her to that rest which knows no waking till the resurrection morn. Mr. Murphy was born in Keokuk, January 17, 1875, was reared here and educated in the St. Peter's Catholic schools. His business career has been of the most commendable nature, and he was always popular with his business associates and his customers. He had a remarkable hold upon all who knew him and those best acquainted with him speak of him only in fondest words of praise.

September 20, 1911, he was married to Miss Christine Donahue, who survives him, with one bright, innocent baby girl, Katharine Maria, who will feel the loss of a dear, devoted husband and father. He was a faithful and devoted member of St. Peter's Catholic church, always prompt and earnest in the performance of every christian duty. He was also a highly respected member of the Knights of Columbus.

The death of this bright, promising young man, who appears to have been universally respected and admired for his many admirable traits, has cast a feeling of sadness over the entire community and the tenderest sympathy of a large number of Keokuk people go to the bereaved family for the death of this kind husband, affectionate father, loyal friend and warm-hearted associate.

AMERICAN BYRD IN MEXICAN CAGE

Has Been Held for Some Time and Governor of Texas Seeks His Release.

[United Press Leased Wire Service.] AUSTIN, Texas, April 4.—Acting upon the request of several friends, Governor Colquhoun has interceded in the behalf of W. M. Byrd, the Texas stockman, who is under military arrest at Cardenas, San Luis Potosi, Mexico, in an effort to obtain Byrd's release. The governor wired the authorities at Mexico City and this afternoon received a telegram from the state department advising that Byrd was still at Cardenas under arrest, but the hearing against him had been concluded and it was favorable to Byrd, but the officers at Cardenas declared Byrd could not be liberated without being sent to Mexico City. Advice from the American consul at San Luis Potosi is to the effect that Byrd is being treated with consideration. A newspaper has reported that President Huerta has ordered Byrd's release but this has not been confirmed. Byrd has been under arrest for some time.

Six Months for Kelly. [United Press Leased Wire Service.] SACRAMENTO, Calif., April 4.—"General" Charles Kelly, leader of the unemployed army recently routed out of Sacramento, was sentenced today by Justice Clark to six months in the county jail after Kelly had been found guilty of vagrancy by a jury. Kelly made an impassioned plea for clemency, asking the court to remember the stigma about to be placed upon his innocent wife and two children.


