In 1885 he was married to Myrtle Glaze and four children, Samuel, Clara, Louisa, Clyde and Irene, all of whom are living, were born to this union. There are three grandchildren. Mr. and Mrs. Corbitt moved to La Harpe twenty-three years ago and have been residents since. He has been sick for ten years and helpless for the past year.

MANY ATTENDING PRESBYTERY HERE

Pastors and Lay Delegates From Keokuk District Are Meeting in U. P. Church This Afternoon.

PROGRAM IS CHANGED TO KNOW RESULT EARLY

Rev. W. R. Sawtell to Preach Sermon in Place of Rev. A. L. Graham This Evening.

The presbytery of the Keokuk district convened at the United Presbyterian church this afternoon at 2:30 o'clock when the devotional exercises were begun by the Rev. D. L. McBride, retiring moderator. The devotional service lasted for twenty minutes and then the routine business of the presbytery was taken up. This business session consumed most of the afternoon's time, and late this afternoon adjournment would be taken.

The evening program tonight of necessity, will be changed. The Rev. A. L. Graham who was to have spoken on the subject, "The Shame of a Smooth Life," is unable to be present. He had to conduct funeral services in his own town and was unable to come to Keokuk this afternoon.

His place on the program this evening will be occupied by the Rev. W. R. Sawtell of Washington, Iowa. Rev. Mr. Sawtell was to have spoken this afternoon but his sermon was saved for this evening when it was found Rev. Mr. Graham could not be present.

The devotional exercises this evening will be led by the Rev. R. H. Park, and following these, the Rev. H. L. Henderson will make a short talk. Rev. Mr. Henderson is the moderator of the convention.

The Keokuk district is composed of fifteen churches. A pastor and lay delegate from each comprise the delegation which is to assemble here for the two days session. However, some of the churches in the district are vacant, and it was expected this afternoon that not more than twenty delegates would be present at this district meeting.

A number of the pastors who are attending the meeting, arrived this afternoon and some of the others will be in in time for the night session and the morning meeting tomorrow. The presbytery will adjourn tomorrow at noon.

ARMY VETERAN DIED THIS MORNING

John G. Niblock, a War Time Member of the Fifth Iowa Cavalry, Passed Away.

John G. Niblock, comparatively a stranger in the city, died at the Union hotel at 10:35 o'clock this morning of paralysis, after an illness of about two weeks. His home was at Oelwein, Iowa, and he stopped off here about two weeks ago on a return trip from St. Louis where he was visiting and had been ill all the time since his arrival here.

Mr. Niblock was a veteran of the civil war, in which memorable conflict he was a member of the Fifth Iowa cavalry. He was a member of the Methodist church. His wife died four years ago last September. He was a native of Pennsylvania, but had been a resident of Iowa for many years as is evidenced by his early enlistment in an Iowa regiment. Two of his sons H. L. and O. H. Niblock of Kansas City, being apprised of their father's condition, hastened to the bedside and are now in the city and are arranging for having the remains borne to Oelwein, his old home for burial, and will likely accompany the remains on an evening train.

The deceased is survived by the following sons and daughters, the two sons from Kansas City, mentioned above, J. F. Niblock of Omaha, Neb., W. E. of Illinois; Mrs. J. E. Robertson, Fredricksburg, Iowa, Mrs. J. R. Jamieson, Joplin, Mo., and Miss Laura Niblock, of Oelwein.

GOOD SIZED VOTE ON SCHOOL BOND

Special Election Being Held This Afternoon Shows That There is Much Interest in the Situation.

TO KNOW RESULT EARLY

Judges and Clerks Expect to Have Ballots Counted in Short Order This Evening.

The voting at the special school election this afternoon was heavy, indicating that there was considerable interest in the issue. The polling place at the George Washington school was a busy place, and a large number of both men and women voted during the afternoon.

The interest in this election has been more than usual and the vote this afternoon was indicative of this. The fact that women were entitled to vote on this issue, and the interest they have taken in the question was shown by the vote which was being polled during the day.

The judges and clerks expect to have the ballots all counted by 8 o'clock, perhaps earlier. The Gate City office will be open this evening and the returns will be received here as soon as the result is known at the polls.

As is usual in questions of this kind, there are separate ballots for the men and women. The ballots are deposited in distinct boxes and are counted separately. The only difference in the two ballots is in the shape.

Big Rush at Opening.

When the polls opened at one o'clock there was a rush for the booths which continued for some time. The women were out in force, and husbands and wives were making the trip to the voting booth together. The George Washington school basement where the election is being held, presented a scene of great animation as the first votes were being cast.

All during the afternoon the voting continued and it is estimated that there will be close to two thousand votes cast during the day. The vote is really above the number expected and shows that the interest in the issue must beat fever heat.

Women Give First Names.

The women all have to give their first names. When they are married their husband's names or initials do not go and they stand on their own merits so far as first names are concerned. The women who voted in the rush first this afternoon were all laughing and joking about their chance to be on even footing with the men. To many of them it was the first time they had the chance to exercise the rights of suffrage, for there were some in the crowd who had just passed their twenty-first birthday—that is, one would judge so from appearances.

Busy Scenes at Polls.

All afternoon there was a swarm of people at the polls. Swarm is the best word to describe the crowd, which was really so large that it became congested around the judges



and clerks table. There was a solid mass of humanity wending its way in the door, to the judges with the ballots, and then to the booths and back to the ballot box. Any one who has seen the crowd around a city precinct voting place can have some idea of the number of people who are in that polling place today. And the women are by no means in the minority. While there is the usual large crowd of male voters, there are almost as many women in each relay which storms the judges desks and the ballot box.

Women are instructed. The women who go into the voting place are by no means strangers to the ways of exercising their rights of suffrage. Their sisters on the outside of the polls have seen to it that they know what to do when they get into the polling place. There are sample ballots sufficient to show the novice how to go about this intricate business of marking a ballot and plenty of women are around the polls to see that their sisters are instructed.

Vote Ten a Minute. It is estimated by the clerks that the voting is being done at the rate of ten a minute. The steady stream of people in the polling place makes this seem a fair estimate. There will be an immense vote cast if the number continues as it has started, and there seems little sign of its showing any lagging. At 2:45 this afternoon the total vote was 976. The total number of men who had voted then was 629 and the women's vote was 337.
