Multiplicity of Matters Handled by the New Administration Herewith Recorded as Official Proceedings.

Resolutions Passed Affecting Certain Streets and Alleys and Board of Health Sessions Held.

April 6, 1914, 10 a. m. The members of the new council of the city of Keokuk, Iowa, to-wit: S. W. Moorhead, mayor; J. A. M. Collins and Frank T. F. Schmidt, councilmen, having been duly elected to the said positions, and having taken the oath of office as prescribed by law, took their seats as such mayor and councilmen. The council was called to order by S. W. Moorhead, who made the following remarks:

"I have no stated address to make, but I want to thank the outgoing city council for their kind wishes and words of encouragement. I can assure you that these are highly appreciated.

"We are to some extent unfamiliar with certain city matters, but we have their assurances that their services are at our command in helping us out to get matters in hand. We will gladly avail ourselves of the privilege which they have extended to us of consulting them as occasion may arise. Again we thank them."

The roll was called and the following were present: S. W. Moorhead, mayor; J. A. M. Collins, councilman; Frank T. F. Schmidt, councilman.

Resolution No. 643.

April 6, 1914.

Be it resolved, By the city council of the city of Keokuk, Iowa:

That for the terms beginning April 6th, 1914, and ending on the first Monday in April, 1916, the various departments of the city of Keokuk are hereby assigned as follows: Mayor, S. W. Moorhead, shall be superintendent of the department of public affairs; Councilman J. A. M. Collins shall be superintendent of the department of accounts and finances, and superintendent of the department of public safety; and Councilman F. T. F. Schmidt shall be superintendent of the department of streets and public improvements and

superintendent of the department of parks and public property.

General ordinance No. 437, having been presented by the city council was read as follows:

General Ordinance No. 437. April 6, 1914.

An ordinance fixing the compensation of the mayor and councilmen of the city of Keokuk, Iowa.

Be it ordained, by the city council of the city of Keokuk, Iowa:

Section 1. That the annual salary of the mayor of the city of Keokuk, be, and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of \$2,100, payable in monthly installments, as provided by chapter 192 of the acts of the 35th general assembly of the state of Iowa.

Section 2. That the annual salary of the councilmen of the said city of Keokuk, be and the same is hereby fixed at the sum of \$1,680, payable in monthly installments as provided by chapter 102 of the acts of the 35th general assembly of the state of Iowa.

Section 3. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with the provision with the provisions hereof are hereby repealed.

Passed and adopted this 6th day of April, 1914, by the following vote:
