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BOARD MEETING OF THE Y. M. C. A.

Well Attended and Very Interesting Proceedings—Election Held for New Officers.

SOME NEW MEMBERS

Letter Sent Out by the Chairman of the Membership Committee to the Members.

A postponed meeting of the board of directors of the Young Men's Christian association was held Friday noon, April 10, at the Y. W. C. A. rooms. The following members were present: President H. C. Brown, H. S. Walker, J. O. Boyd, J. E. Forney, P. G. Benner, L. C. Howe, L. Matless, G. Colingwood Tucker, General Secretary Burns, Cephas Harrison, A. W. Hulson.

The report of the physical committee, Chas. Allen, chairman, showed that 1,402 members had made use of the gymnasium during the month of March. A recommendation made by the committee that the tennis court be graded three feet to the south was approved. The fee to members for this privilege will be \$3.00. A recommendation relative to the use of the net proceeds from the minstrel to be given in the opera house May 1st, go to assist worthy young men in attendance at the summer conference at Lake Geneva was adopted.

The report of the boys committee was given by A. W. Hulson, chairman. The committee held one meeting during March. Two recommendations were made by the committee: 1st, that the fees in the boys department be changed from a flat fee of \$5.00 to the following scale: Boys 10 to 13 years old, \$4.00; 13 to 16, \$5.00; 16 to 18, \$6.00. The locker fee of \$1.00 will remain the same for all boys. This recommendation was adopted, also that a campaign for members be held April 15th to 25th. As an incentive to boys who secure a member, one month's time will be added to their year's membership; also boys who join the association and pay their fee in full will be given a membership for fifteen months beginning May 1st. The recommendation was approved.

Report of the social committee, V. R. McKay, chairman. During March, 489 members played pocket billiards; the receipts were \$26.06. The chess game is still in progress with Kahoka. The committee will tender the Kahoka king a reception when he is captured.

Report of the membership committee, C. M. Finney, chairman: Senior members received during March: Clarence W. Olinger, Chas. J. Burke, C. A. Devero, Elmer Dickson, Howard Montague, Juniors, Edward Vath. The committee is making plans for the securing of new members during April. Every member of the association is being asked to have a part in this service. The round-up days will be April 22nd and 23rd.

The report of the religious work committee was made by L. C. Howe, chairman. Three Sunday meetings were held during March with the following speakers: March 15th, Rev. Irving Johnson, D. D., of Minneapolis; March 22nd, Rev. Dr. Patterson of Belfast, Ireland; March 29, Mr. S. S. McClure of New York. The committee is planning for some extension work in the near future.

The report of the finance committee was read by the treasurer, H. S. Walker. Receipts for March were \$805.72; disbursements, \$810.47.

The report of the executive committee was read by the chairman, Leonard Matless. The roof was repaired and put in good condition. Other minor repairs were made.

A recommendation was made by Secretary Burns that the board extend a vote of thanks to Mr. C. S. Pond for his courtesy in donating to the association, wrestling mats and cover for us in the gymnasium. The recommendation was approved. The annual meeting of the association will be Thursday, May 14. Mr. K. A. Shumaker, state secretary of Illinois, will be the guest of honor.

The following officers were re-elected for another year: President—H. C. Brown. Vice President—G. C. Tucker. Secretary—J. E. Forney. Treasurer—H. S. Walker.
