Age 77 years, born in Cincinnati, Ohio, army, was desperate in the extreme,

according to indications visible here today. After a hand to hand encounter lasting several hours, the rebel forces drove the federals out of the city so precipitately that the latter were compelled to abandon their dead and wounded. An examination of the town by rebel officials today showed numerous dead bodies in the streets and in adobe houses. With the federal dead were found the corpses of rebel soldiers, showing how closely the rival armies fought.

The losses on both sides were heavy. The rebel wounded are being cared for in hospital trains brought up from Torreon this afternoon, the seriously wounded having been sent back to Torreon hospitals. The federal wounded are cared for in the same way.

Tonight burial parties are going about burying, or burning the corpses. Many federal prisoners were taken and all of these are being employed in this work. Several hundred rifles and a quantity of ammunition were captured by General Villa's troops.

News here regarding the fighting near Benavides and Parras comes through Torreon and General Villa has ordered a strict censorship. All that is known is that a savage battle was raging near Parras at last accounts.

**Censorship on Again.**  
EL PASO, Texas, April 11.—General Villa has re-established the rigid censorship which prevailed for days during the Torreon campaign. Every time he has done this, subsequent developments have shown he was meeting stubborn resistance or was near a defeat. The federal forces which retreated from San Pedro Friday instead of following the railroad towards Monterrey has turned southward, indicating an intention of making for Saltillo. There was sharp fighting last night and early today at Benavides station.

Parras, where Velasco is supposed to be besieged by Villa's main force, is the home of Francisco I. Madero, the murdered president of Mexico. The constitutionalists hope to avenge their late chief's assassin by administering a stinging defeat to Huerta's army there.

**Fighting Velasco.**  
EL PASO, Texas, April 11.—Aside from brief dispatches that a desperate battle was being fought between Torreon and Saltillo, no word had come from the headquarters of General Francisco Villa at Torreon tonight. The lack of news was regarded by constitutionalists in Juarez as ominous and the belief was general that the engagements progressing at Parras and other points near San Pedro, Coahuila, was taking the entire strength of Villa's seasoned army.

Two separate battles were in progress when the last meager reports were received early today. The most important was that at Parras, ninety-eight miles east of Torreon and 100 miles west of Saltillo where General Refugio Velasco's main body of federals was being attacked by the combined constitutionalist forces of General Francisco Cos, General Luis Herrera and General Eugenio Aguirre Bonavides. The latter brigade—the Zaragoza brigade—bore the brunt of most of the early fighting before Torreon and lost nearly forty percent of its strength.

Nearer to San Pedro, another federal column was being engaged by troops of General Toribio Ortega and Rosalio Hernandez. The identity of this column has not been established.

**U. S. Marines Aimos: Landed.**  
VERA CRUZ, April 11.—Only by a hair's breadth was the landing of United States marines in Tampico averted. It was reported tonight when additional details of the arrest of an officer and men from a whale boat of the Dolphin by Mexican federals were received here.

General Maas, military governor of Vera Cruz is making every effort to obtain full details of the arrest and the demand of Rear Admiral Mayo that the American flag be saluted by the firing of twenty-one guns. His investigation is being conducted at the order of General Huerta.

According to information here, the United States transport Prairie left her anchorage yesterday afternoon and tied up at the Tampico wharf. She was loaded with marines ready for landing. Preparations for sending the men ashore were going forward rapidly, when the launch was seen hurrying across the harbor. There was an interval of waiting and the launch steamed up at full speed and a sealed envelope was delivered to the officer in command. The launch came to the Florida, outside the harbor, and on receipt of the message, the Prairie cast away and returned her anchorage.

What message was delivered to the Prairie is not known but the marines were ready to go ashore when the launch reached the transport.

General Huerta has demanded full information as to Rear Admiral Mayo's demand that the flag be saluted, as well as the arrests from the commanding military officers at Tampico. The only communication between Mexico City and Tampico is through several lengthy telegrams to the capital, reporting the incident.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., April 11.—When the national executive committee of the Associated Advertising Clubs of America took a stand today in opposition to the use of "truth" by honest advertisers for any purposes whatever, there was forecasted one of the stiffest fights that will come before the national convention of the associated clubs at Toronto this summer.

The plan of allowing honest advertisers the use of the emblem in signifying their standing, originated at Fort Worth, a poll of 83 of the 127 clubs shows that all but ten of these favored some means whereby the advertiser could use the emblem.

The executive committee believes it would be cheaper to use it in any way with advertisements and the Ft. Worth club was reprimanded. The emblem committee reported today favoring the use of the emblem without charge by certified advertisers and made public its own report when the executive committee failed to do so.
